

SOCCER SCHEDULE APPROACHES CLIMAX

League Tournament Draws To Close; Six Games Left Unplayed.

The intramural soccer season at Nebraska is coming to a climax with only six more scheduled games to be played off. It is essential that all postponed or for other reasons unplayed games be played some time this week if they are to be considered in the percentage of the teams concerned.

Oct. 29, field No. 1, Kappa Sigma vs. Delta Upsilon, 5 p. m.; field No. 2, Delta Sigma Phi vs. Alpha Gamma Rho, 5 p. m.

A great deal of interest has been shown toward this newly instituted sport in the intramural schedule, according to officials. Many spectators and members of rival teams have attended the games, and with the close of the season many of the teams have developed considerable skill.

Tuesdays and Thursdays. Negotiations are under way to secure about six dual meets with other schools. A larger turn out for the squad is expected later in the season when the meet schedule has been completed.

INTERCOLLEGE BALL APPROACHES FINALS

First Round Matches Are Played; Four Teams Remain in Race.

The next event on the inter-college program is basketball and tentative lineups should be under the consideration of the various college managers. Basketball will start immediately following the completion of the playground ball tournament.
