

# Yearlings Take Spotlight As Varsity Takes Rest

## GRID SQUAD GETS TWO WEEKS REST

### Coach Bible Optimistic Concerning Remainder Husker Football Schedule as Injured Men Round Into Shape for Oklahoma Sooners.

### YEARLINGS TACKLE MISSOURI CUBS SATURDAY

### Rhodes Polishes Frosh Offense in Preparation for Bengal Invasion and First Real Test to Decide Neophyte Lead in Big Six Race.

Football activity within the camp of the Nebraska Cornhuskers will be directed on yearling pigskin toters this week as Coach Chippy Rhodes rounds his frosh into shape for the coming season on tap for this Saturday in Memorial stadium with the University of Missouri freshman team.

Captain Dana X. Bible, head tutor of Scarlet football, welcomes this Saturday with a great deal of optimism as his gridiron charges take their first Saturday afternoon practice the opening of football practice on Sept. 15.

Very light practice will be the schedule throughout this week with the major share of the work going to the squad which has been in the least active service. Fundamental work such as tackling, blocking and perfecting their trick plays and ball deception has been done for the football spotlight in the Nebraska camp this week.

Coach Bible will leave his post at Nebraska over the week end to scout the Sooners in action against the K. U. eleven and give the varsity a complete day of rest.

Football coach at Nebraska, he begins right out loud.

Considering that by the time 7 o'clock rolls around on Saturday afternoon Nov. 16, the Husker coach will have Claude Rowley, flashy Husker back, in shape for the game. Vic Scherzinger back in condition. Clair Shoss ready to go. Dutch Witte in shape. Ray Richards in the line and a week's rest just completed. Bible feels optimistic. He stated Tuesday that his team reached the peak when the line held the pounding and driving Bausch from scoring that touchdown and with two weeks of rest, they should be in the best of condition of the season and much wiser and smarter from their past experience.

The injury list is progressing in nice shape and some of the bruises were not as serious as at first thought. Clair Shoss, the Cornhusker's triple-threat act, is coming along in nice shape and should be at his post of the 1929 season by next week. Ray Richards suffered a broken nose which team physicians hope to have replaced in good shape by kickoff time on Nov. 16. Prucka and Lewandowski have been on the list since the Pitt game and will be ready for the Sooner game while two weeks' rest will put Dutch Witte in tip-top condition. Claude Rowley's addition to the Husker backfield will be a great boost for the Huskers. Rowley received a broken collar bone in the S. M. U. game and has not been in suit since. Vic Scherzinger, who was injured in the Syracuse game, will also add to the power of the Cornhusker aerial attack.

### NO SCRIMMAGE

The Cornhusker mentor announced there would be no open practice session today as he intends to spend today in skull drills and chalk talks. The Tuesday night practice found the director of Nebraska football taking the rostrum in his football class in a two hour period of diagram work over what has happened in the opening five games.

A short lecture on tactics of the fundamental variety with a great deal of criticism on tackling methods employed by the Scarlet featured the session. Ball deception lacking in the Kansas game was the firm opinion of the Husker mentor and he stated that the Huskers had many opportunities to use strategy and save their energy but instead they resorted to the most difficult way and used up energy and opened the path to the injury column. It is his phase of the game that D. X. Bible will work on during the following days of practice which will lead up to the Oklahoma clash on Memorial stadium field.

### NUBBINS GET CHANCE

Thursday and Friday afternoon will find Nebraska's football squad taking part in the first scrimmage of the week in which a light signal drill and dummy scrimmage will be staged to keep the varsity football warriors fresh on the attack that Bible plans to launch against the crew from the southland. The squad members who have been but little service during the fall campaign are the men in line to receive the most tutoring in the Thursday and Friday practice.

Bible plans to experiment with a new backfield or possibly some new combinations during this week. At no time since the opening of the season in September has the new Nebraska football coach had an opportunity to take stock of what he has in the line of reserves and material for 1930. This week will afford him that change that he has been wanting.

### CYCLONE GRIDSTERS SHOW IMPROVEMENT

After their two weeks of football rest of the Big Six, Coach Henry then will direct his attention to two more Big Six battles which will be a pair of naturals—Kansas and Oklahoma. Both the Sooners and Jayhawks will prove plenty tough for the Mizzou eleven and Henry will have to muster his full force to down these two teams.

Big Jim Bausch, the spark plug of the Kansas football eleven, took the lead Saturday in the Big Six scores when he fell on the ball after a Nebraska punt had been blocked. Bausch leads the Big Six scorers with a total of 24 points garnered from four touchdowns in five games. Marsters, the Dartmouth flash, is by far the most outstanding backfield scorer in the country, leading with 108 points in six games. Marsters has scored 14 touchdowns and is making one of the greatest bids of the season for an all-American berth.

With two weeks to think over what Dana X. Bible, the new Cornhusker football coach, has done at Nebraska after spending his first two months with us, we wonder how soon it will be until some yowler will pipe up with "What's the matter with Nebraska football?" Only two months to whip a team into shape for what football critics said was the hardest

schedule a new coach has had to face in many years. Five tough opponents that very nearly sap the whole strength of the Scarlet and Cream football squad and with Dana X. at the helm, the Cornhuskers came through with but one defeat out of five to mark the record, and the team that turned in that defeat has not been beaten and has dented Ohio State, Allegheny, West Virginia, Duke and Waynesburg. Coach Bible has given Nebraska more than they expected, more than could be expected from a new coach with such a schedule. He has three remaining games on the schedule, two of them tough and one comparatively easy and at present he has the best chance of any coach in the Big Six to cop off the grid iron title.
