

Cornhuskers Will Be In Top Form for Sooners

SCARLET RESUMES STRENUOUS DRILL

Coach Bible Begins Drive in Preparation for Battle With Oklahoma; Squad Examines Opponents' Formations in Classroom Monday.

NEBRASKA LEADS BIG SIX AS RESULT OF GAMES

Optimism Reigns in Husker Camp; Scherzinger and Rowley Return From Injury List; Richards Is Only Warrior Out of Shape.

After taking a week of rest from all heavy football work, the University of Nebraska Cornhuskers jumped into action last evening on the sod for a stiff five days of drilling for the all important Big Six clash with Oklahoma's Sooner eleven this Saturday in Nebraska's annual Dad's day football classic. Coach Dana Bible will have his full squad back in shape for the Oklahoma game after completing one of the hardest early season schedules a Nebraska team has had to face in many years.

With the Sooners' defeat at the hands of Kansas last week, Nebraska took the leadership of the Big Six in the 1929 football race by virtue of their one victory over Kansas in the Homecoming game. The Sooner-Husker game in Memorial Stadium this Saturday will be the first time an Oklahoma team has appeared before Nebraska football fans for many years. In the old Missouri Valley conference, the two schools had not met since 1923.

Coach Dana X Bible, the Cornhusker pigskin mentor, began his drive for the Sooners last night with a full schedule for his Scarlet warriors. An hour of classroom work with Oklahoma plays and formations examined, started the session and then two hours on the field completed the first day of workout for the Nebraska squad. A short scrimmage drill ended the practice and tonight will find the Huskers hard at it again in preparation for the important conference game on the state this Saturday.

Optimism Reigns. The optimism which reigned over the camp of the Cornhuskers last week has not been dimmed but if anything increased as the Huskers were idle and slid into first place in the Big Six standings. Oklahoma's defeat by Kansas took the Sooners out of first place while the victory of the K-Aggies over Iowa State sent the McMillin crew into second place. Coach Bible plans to send a host of new gridders into the Oklahoma

game Saturday but early indications are that the regular backfield and line will start minus the services of Big Ray Richards who is nursing a broken nose received in the Kansas game.

Captain George Farley, Clair Sloan, Dutch Witte and either Red Young, Claude Rowley, Marvin Paul or Frahn will complete the set to start Saturday. With the addition of Rowley, it is quite probable that he will fill the fourth position altho the flashy back has not been in action since the opening game with the Southern Methodist Mustangs. Rowley's addition to the Husker backfield gives Nebraska a boost in ball blocking and punting. He is one of the greatest punters in the Husker camp and was out in suit for the first time late last week. The passing department will also be bolstered quite a bit with the return of Vic Scherzinger, passing ace of the Husker squad. Scherzinger has been on the injury list since the Syracuse game but will be in top form for the Sooners this week.

Richards is Out.

The only casualty to grace the injury column this week is Richards. He will suit up for the game Saturday but it is doubtful as to whether he will be sent into the game as Coach "Bunny" Oakes wants the big tackle to fully recuperate from his injury in order that he will be in shape for the Aggie game next week in which the Huskers expect the test of the season as to the power of the Big Six conference. Frank Prucka is another Husker squad member who returned for action Monday as well as Lew Lewandowski who has been out with two broken fingers since the inter-sectional game with the Panthers.

Captain Frank Crider of the Oklahoma Sooners is headlined as one of the foremost backs in the Big Six conference and is the main spring around which the Sooner offense centers. His twisting, spinner plays have completely stunned other members of the conference and he is expected to be the main attack against the Scar-

let in Saturday's game as well as the Sooner aerial game which was stopped in the Kansas game on account of the field condition. Coach Ad Lindsay of the Sooner squad has one of the most polished passing games in the conference and the Husker coaching staff expects the southern school to rely a great deal on their passes.

Three Games Remain.

Three more games remain on the Husker schedule and those are all with conference foes, Oklahoma, K-Aggies and Iowa State. To win the remaining three games means the second consecutive Big Six championship for the Ne-

braska Cornhuskers. The dope bucket favors a Husker victory in Saturday's game with Oklahoma while the big test of the conference season is on deck for next week when the Huskers meet the Kansas Aggie at Manhattan. The Aggie game is looked forward to as one of the greatest football battles in the conference and seems to be slated to determine the Big Six championship. Iowa State with a slate of defeats will furnish the Husker opposition in the Thanksgiving day game as Coach Dana Bible ends his first year as a Cornhusker football coach.

RHODES PRAISES FRESHMAN SQUAD ON PERFORMANCE

Line Receives Particular Attention on Ability Displayed.

Yearlings Meet Oklahoma On Saturday; Expect Hard Battle.

Choppy Rhodes was very proud of the way his freshman gridders disposed themselves Saturday, in the game against the Missouri yearlings. He was especially proud of the way the fresh line held and outcharged the forwards of the Tiger school. Captain Lehman molded one potent line out of material that looked to be rather mediocre before the season started.

Smart football was the cause of the blocked kick that netted the Huskers their second touchdown. Two men on the right side of the line shifted and helped form a wedge that easily drove through the Tiger forwards. So many men broke through that it was impossible to ascertain which one actually blocked the kick. Captain Lehman had coached the men to do just what they did, and that is considered smart football. Maybe "Ye Ed" heard something about that play, but as yet he has not issued any comment to that effect.

Ends Perform Well. The two ends, Durkee and Nesmith took a page out of the book of Donchess, the Pittsburgh end. They were turning any play that came their way into the line. Once a play was headed into the "little big" Husker line, it usually was promptly smothered. Ely is one smart lineman, he was calling the formations for the backfield like a veteran.

Choppy was of the opinion that his crew beat a good team last Saturday, and that they will have a harder game next Saturday. Oklahoma, it is reported, has one of the best first year teams in the Big Six, and Nebraska will have one real battle when they play the men from the southern school.

No Injuries on List. All of the men on the fresh team came through last Saturday's game without an injury. Choppy attributes this to the fact that they were all playing hard football. Accidents only happen when the men are playing in a lax fashion. The players were keyed up to the right pitch for the game, and they all played a good game.



the flashy hero in the Ohio State game, was also the outstanding performer against Washington and Jefferson. Parkinson, Pitt fullback, also figured in prominently in the decisive victory for the Panthers. Two more games, Carnegie Tech and Penn State are the only games remaining between Pitt and a national championship.

Choppy Rhodes paraded one of the greatest freshman eleven out on Memorial Stadium field last Saturday that any Missouri crew has ever had to face. From all indications the Husker eleven in 1932 should be a real gridiron eleven. John Roby, the Nelson backfield ace, displayed his football wares in great shape in Saturday's game. His dazzling runs through the Tiger cubs brought great ovations from the small crowd of rain-soaked fans huddled in the stadium. But the work of Edward Dunn of Lexington, another backfield flash, Chris Mathis, frosh quarter, and Jack Miller, fullback, were not placed in the back row. In fact this quartet started by Rhodes appeared to be everything that goes to make up great Cornhusker teams of the future. And the work of the great frosh line that seemed to work in machine like manner on every Tiger play was another highlight of the game. A highly polished frosh eleven that completely outplayed the Tiger yearlings in every department of the game was the result of Nebraska's first freshman game since 1926.

The Kansas-Oklahoma game at Norman last Saturday which resulted in Oklahoma's first defeat in the conference, sent the Cornhuskers to first place in the 1929 football title race. The Jayhawks and Sooners played on a soggy field with the Sooners' highly polished passing game greatly handicapped by the field condition. The 7 to 0 score for the Kansas eleven was the result of the same or practically the same play which brought in the only Kansas score against Nebraska. The Kansas crew blocked an Oklahoma punt on the 1-yard line and in one play "Frosty" Cox lugged the pellet over for the only counter of the afternoon. Jim Bausch, the Kansas fullback, was carried from the field early in the game which deprived Kansas of her main scoring threat. Frank Bausch center, was also not in the game during the entire period. With these two 200-pounders out, the dope bucket swings to a Cornhusker victory in Saturday's game in Lincoln.

One more gridiron eleven fell by the wayside in the terrific drive of the Pitt Panthers in their attempt to capture a mythical national football title this year. The latest victim is Washington and Jefferson which until Saturday had not been scored on, but a mighty team of Panthers from Pittsburgh rolled across 21 points on the W. and J. eleven and held its opponents scoreless. A statement released Sunday from Hanover, N. H. by N. H. Hedges, athletic director at Dartmouth, revealed the fact that the eastern school had been negotiating with Nebraska for a football game on the 1930 schedule. Hedges announced that he had received an invitation from Nebraska authorities for a game in 1930 but that when the invitation arrived, the 1930 slate for Dartmouth had been completed and that it would be two seasons at least before a contract between the two schools could be signed.

With but two conference games tucked away off the 1929 slate, no Cornhusker football ace appears in the leading scorers of the conference. In fact the amount of points rolled up so far this season, it is decidedly small. Jim Bausch, the Kansas fullback, has taken the lead in individual scoring and has a total of 24 points accumulated in four games while Clair Sloan, the leading Cornhusker scorer, has chalked up seven points in conference competition so far this season, to rank in fifth place with Dutch Witte with six points rank with the host of conference scorers who have made one touchdown. Sloan, Witte and Hukuf are the three members of the Scarlet eleven to score in the two Big Six games played so far this season.
