

Husker Rating Goes Up on Eve of Wildcat Game

TEAM DISPLAYS OLD TIME FIGHT

Bible Is Pleased With Enthusiasm of Gridmen on Field During Past Week; Claude Rowley Will Not Be in Top Shape by Saturday.

OFFENSIVE IS BUILT AROUND YOUNG, FARLEY

K-Aggies Are Expected to Employ Passing Attack to Score Against Improved Defense Shown Up By Nebraska Squad in Practice.

Nebraska's last strenuous workout of the week took place last night as Coach Bible and his staff of Husker coaches prepared for the game with Kansas Aggies this week, the game that decides the 1929 champion of the Big Six football kingdom. By the way the Scarlet gridgers were taking their daily grid lesson, it indicated that the K-Aggies will have plenty to handle in those eleven fighting Husker warriors.

Cornhusker offensive has been on the uphill climb during the past two days and the Husker pigskin tutor is somewhat pleased with the zip and enthusiasm that has come over his Scarlet eleven the past two days. Claude Rowley, Nebraska's injured triple-threat ace is getting a small share of the heavy duty work, and it appears that Nebraska will have the Kansas flash in the game when they meet the Wildcats at Manhattan tomorrow.

Farley, Young Star.

Captain George Farley and Red Young, the two Husker backfield aces who are booked to do the greater portion of the ball toting tomorrow, have displayed their greatest form of the season this week and it is hoped that with the assistance of Bud McBride and Harold Peaker will be the necessary drive to outscore the Wildcats in the title game Saturday.

Bennie Marquis, reserve quarterback, has been getting the call for the regular quartet this week and from the showing made by the Central City youth, he may see action in the Aggie game. His field generalship and decisions have been good and his only handicap is his inexperience and this has cropped out several times during his season. Marquis, Wittie and Peaker will give Dana Bible three pilots to call on against the McMillin crew while Frahm, Rowley, Paul and Scherzinger will be on deck to take up the slack at half-back and at tailback.

Husker Ends are Impressive. The wingmen to get the call against the Aggies will be Steve Hokuf and "Buck" Morgan, two of the greatest end men in the conference. Both Hokuf and Morgan have displayed sensational work this season and Coach Ed Wittie will have Joe Still, Lew Lewandowski, Hi Fricka and Morris Fisher to relieve these two wingmen. This squad of terminal men will give the Huskers the edge over the Aggie ends and will be another point in the favor of the underdog Nebraska team which enters the Kansas Aggie stadium for the first time in years rated as the unfavorable team.

Barring injuries Nebraska's forward wall should be in top shape to meet the Aggies this week for the championship. With the return of Ray Richards to his old tackle position, Nebraska's line will have its spark plug and key man for this all-important game this week. Richards was kept out of the Sooner game in order that he would be in the best of shape for the crucial game at Manhattan. Working in the line with the big tackle will be Dutch Koster and Jim Gilbert at guards, Hugh Rhea, Red Ray and Broadstone for the other tackle position while Elmer Greenberg, Gaylord Burgeson and Ralph Jeffries will be ready for service when needed. Paul Morrison and Feller Mansdam will be called to handle the pivot job with no decision made by "Bunny" Oakes as to who will receive the starting call.

Coach Expects Passes. Coach Dana Bible looks to a barrage of forward passes from the Aggie eleven and is grooming his best defensive passing aces against the expected aerial game that McMillin will launch. Nebraska defensive in this department of the game is led by Feller Mansdam in the line and Captain George Farley in the backfield, two of the best on the Husker eleven.

The return of Rowley to the Husker backfield was the one plug the Husker coaching staff wanted in their backfield machine but as the eve of the big classic draws near it appears that Rowley after being out of practice since the with S. M. U. will not be well enough versed on signals to take a very active part in the battle against the K-Aggies tomorrow. Rowley's work as a punter, however, may draw him into the game should Nebraska get into a tight place where punting would bring the Scarlet out of danger. Rowley's punting toe has saved Nebraska defeat many times during

they met Missouri on the stadium field in Lincoln. It was agreed that very few eleven in the country could have beaten Nebraska on that day as they rode at will over the Tiger eleven to amass some forty points. McMillin has succeeded in driving his Aggie team to the same peak and what will happen Saturday is worth seeing.

About the only consolation we can find this week is in some of the outstanding fresh gridgers who displayed their wares on the soggy sod against the Tiger cubs two weeks ago. In Les Penny, backfield ace who scored two touchdowns for the fresh, Coach Bible is going to find a real footballer next year. In Jack Miller, the Omaha flash; in Dunn, Roby and Mattie. Coach Bible will find some great material to replace Sloan, Farley, Wittie, Peaker and Bud McBride. Chippy Rhodes did not get a great amount of heavy material this season in his yearling proteges but in speed, power and plenty of fight, he was fortunate and from what the Husker state did send the yearling coach, he made a good team.

Alumni of Purdue are urging officials of the Rose tournament to invite the Purdue Boilermakers to compete in the annual tournament of roses gridiron fest at Pasadena on New Year's day. The Purdue eleven has gone through the season without a defeat and have already captured the championship of the Big Ten. Only Indiana remains on the Boilermakers schedule and even though it is turned in a defeat, the championship would go to the Purdue eleven. Pitt, Notre Dame and Purdue are in line for the invitation game and as yet officials of the eastern event have sent no invitations to an opposing eastern eleven.

UNIVERSITY PLANS TO GRANT SCHOLARSHIPS

Seven \$100 Awards Will Be Made by Christmas. Pike Reports.

Applications and recommendations for the seven university scholarships to be granted in December, must be turned in at the chancellor's office before Dec. 1, according to Lawrence Pike, secretary to the chancellor. Announcement of the winners will be made some time prior to the Christmas vacation, and the funds presented to the students before the end of the semester. Each of the scholarships carries with it a fund of \$100. Three of these are those recently announced in honor of Henry C. Bostwick, by Prof. F. N. Meneffe of Ann Arbor, Mich., and Mrs. C. H. Massey of Washington, D. C. The remaining grants are the scholarships given by a Nebraska banker, first awarded in January, 1925, the Edward Lang True Memorial scholarship, the Jefferson H. Broady scholarship, and the W. H. Sawyer scholarship.

Offensive scrimmaging was held last night against varsity reserves, and tonight the preps will attempt to stop the varsity who will be using Drake plays. A squad of about 25 men will be available for the game.

Nebraska-K-Aggie Competition Dates Back to Time of 59 to 0 Score in 1911

Nebraska and K-Aggies started their rivalry in football nearly twenty years ago, but the men from the Kansas school have not been able to annex a victory in all that time. In 1925, they earned a moral victory, when they held Nebraska to a scoreless tie. Starting with 1911, Nebraska won twelve out of the thirteen games played. The first year of competition found the Farmers on the wrong end of a 59 to 0 drubbing. That was the largest score that was ever rolled up between the two schools. In the 13 games played, the K-Aggies have only scored in three games, making a total of 24 points. Only four games have found the Huskers with less than twenty points.

Last year, during a drizzling rain, the McMillin proteges held Nebraska to a single touchdown and one safety. This year, after a year of usage of the McMillin type of play, they figure to play Nebraska to a standstill, or maybe to even force the Scarlet into reverse. The spirit on the Aggie campus is the greatest in years, and that all helps to win football games.

The Wildcats have lost one conference game this year, but to offset that, they have won three games. One of the teams that they have beaten was plenty hard for Nebraska to even earn a tie with, i. e. Missouri. They beat Kansas in better style than Nebraska was able to. If the Kansans win the game against Nebraska, they will virtually clinch the championship.

Coach McMillin had an open date last weekend, and most of his coaching staff was in the press box watching and plotting Nebraska's plays. The advantage of the open date will stand them in very good stead, for at this time of the year a rest is invaluable. His players are all in shape to play the game of their lives, and they

will be in there Saturday to do that very thing. Coach Bible and his crew are out to show that history repeats itself, but it is going to be one serious struggle. This game is the difference between a successful season and a mediocre one. If the Bibemen lose Saturday, they will descend to fifth place, or next to the bottom in the Big Six standings. This is the crucial game of the season.
