University Has Students of Various Ages; Some Under Five Years Old

The reason Nebraska turns out such good football teams, according to a New York sports writer is "because they pick their teams early." There are students attending the university who are as young as four and a half years. Twenty-one small sons and daughters of Lincoln people attend the nursery school in the department of economics at the college of agriculture. Miss Ruth Staples is director of the nursery school, assisted by Miss Louis Leaton, who also has charge of the home management house, and Mrs. Angelina Carlson Anderson.

The university maintains the nursery school primarily as a laboratory for the study of the mental, physical and social development of young children. The program is so arranged that it is also of direct benefit to the children attending. Both indoor and outdoor play and a brief story or music period are included in the morning. Following this the children have a short rest, and are then served a wholesome and suitable luncheon at noon. They assist in setting the tables and in serving themselves and each other.

Hen at Ag College Cackles Her Way to Egg Laying Record

One hen at the agricultural college has just "cackled" herself into a distinctive class of birds. The cackling did not interest her keepers but the number of eggs she laid established a new record for the University of Nebraska poultry flock. Hen No. X-284 laid 303 eggs in 365 days. This is the first 300-egger at the ag college and few hens anywhere reach this mark.

Her highest production for one month was thirty eggs and nineteen was the lowest number.

Through the breeding season "X-284" laid sixty-three eggs for hatching purposes, all of which were fertile. Forty-eight of them developed chicks.

The hen continued to lay eggs in spite of outside disturbances, attendants said. She started her record in a flock mating pen. Later she went into a breeding pen and after the breeding season she moved into another house with 125 strange birds.

Psychologists Hate Hair-Raising Cloud on Laboratory Table Work

"Table," "cloud," "hate," and "hair" are about as unrelated as any four words could be. At first it seems as if there are very few possible sentences which could combine the four. But in the laboratory sections of psychology 71 last week, there were a great variety of combinations offered spontaneously by the students. "Construct one sensible sentence containing the four words: hair, table, cloud, and hate." That was the instruction given. In thirty-five seconds a feminine ingenuity had composed this: "As she appeared at the table, hair unkempt, she brought hate, like a stormy cloud, ruthlessness in its destruction." One coed found a surprisingly simple solution and in just fifteen seconds had devised and written, "I hate to cloud your view of the table with my hair."

less than a minute after the problem was stated: "A cloud came over the people at the table as mention of his red hair, which all red-headed people hate, was made to Jim." Perhaps the most ingenious sentence was written twenty-three seconds after the instruction was given. It read: "Construct a sentence containing the words: hair, table, cloud, and hate" adequately fulfilling the conditions of a single, sensible sentence using the four words.
