

HUSKERS WIN ONE OF FOUR GAMES

But Cage Squad Shows Up Well, According to Sports Writers of St. Louis, Pittsburgh; Offense Works Much Better Than Defense.

GRACE IS HIGH SCORER WITH 42 POINT TOTAL

Maclay Second With 30 Points; Witte Does Good Work At Guard Post; Big Six Standings Promise Stiff Competition in Later Games.

Charley Black and his squad of Cornhusker basketballers emerged from their eastern jaunt with one victory in four starts. Inability to score from the free throw line was one of the big reasons why the team failed to win more games.

Regardless of the number of games won, the object of the trip was to put the team in first class shape for the Big Six season. A number of nice things were said about the team by the eastern sports writers. At Pittsburgh the scribes accredited the Cornhuskers with being a classy ball club, at St. Louis, the first game, it was said that the men in scarlet were a rangy, well drilled team.

With the four games of the eastern trip under their belts, the team should show to a decided fine advantage for the bunting in the conference race. If the team had been able to drop the ball through on gift tosses, the record would have read three won and one lost.

Harve Grace was the outstanding performer for the scarlet team, personally accounting for 42 of Nebraska's 125 points. He reached his zenith in the West Virginia game, when he dropped nine field goals and one free throw through the hoop. He was the high point man for the Cornhusker team in the Butler game, when he tossed five field goals through the basket. This easy going basketballer from Mascot will be serving notice on the high point men of the conference, if he keeps going at the rate he set on the eastern courts.

Don Maclay was very much in evidence in all of the games, being high point man in the Pitt and St. Louis games. Maclay handles himself exceedingly well on the floor, considering the fact that he is several inches over six foot. He was runner-up to Grace for the high point total for the trip, accounting for 30 points in the four games.

Witte appears to be about as versatile a guard as there is on the squad. During the West Virginia game, the Dutchman was breaking up a good share of the Mountaineers' plays. In both the Butler and St. Louis games, he made six points.

Defense is ragged. Reports are to the effect that the team was using a very fast breaking offense, but the defense was a bit ragged in spots. The reason for this can probably be attributed to the fact that the team had not been at the game long enough.

St. Louis displayed a powerful offense in the closing minutes of the game, and the Nebraskans were unable to cope with it. Ten minutes before the close of the game, the Cornhuskers were four points ahead of the St. Louis team.

Schulte Asks More Managers to Report

Coach Henry F. Schulte, head track coach, has issued a call for sophomore track managers to report to managers Eret and Miller this week. The indoor track season is getting under full way and more sophomore track managers are needed. The two varsity managers, Emil Eret and Wendell Miller, will be in the stadium from 3 until 6 o'clock every afternoon this week.

INDOOR TRACK WORK SWINGS INTO ACTION

Schulte States Desire for More Material; Repair Inside Cinders.

The indoor track season at Nebraska is getting under full way under the direction of Head Track Coach Henry F. "Indian" Schulte. The veteran cinder path tutor expressed his desire Monday to have more men turning out for the indoor track season.

During the holidays the indoor track under the east stadium was repaired and put in condition for the coming season and now is one of the best in the Big Six conference. The meets for the season will find Nebraska's cinder artists busy throughout the winter months with the big indoor meet of the Big Six conference climaxed in the spring.

Schulte stated that he would like to see more men coming out for the daily workouts, freshmen as well as varsity men. Coach "Choppy" Rhodes and Jimmy Lewis are assisting Schulte in getting the Husker tracksters into shape for the 1930 season and all indications point to another successful year on the track for Nebraska.



Nebraska's Cornhusker basketball team did not profit so extensively from its barnstorming trip through the east during the holidays that is, they did not pile up many points in the winning margin although the Husker cagers are probably much wiser for their trip. West Virginia was the only quintet to fall before the Scarlet from the plains of Nebraska while St. Louis, Butler and Pitt took the count on the Cornhuskers for the first defeats of the season. Coach Black and his cagers are back on Nebraska soil once more and will open the conference season at Manhattan this week and take on the Montana State five on the coiseum floor on Saturday night.

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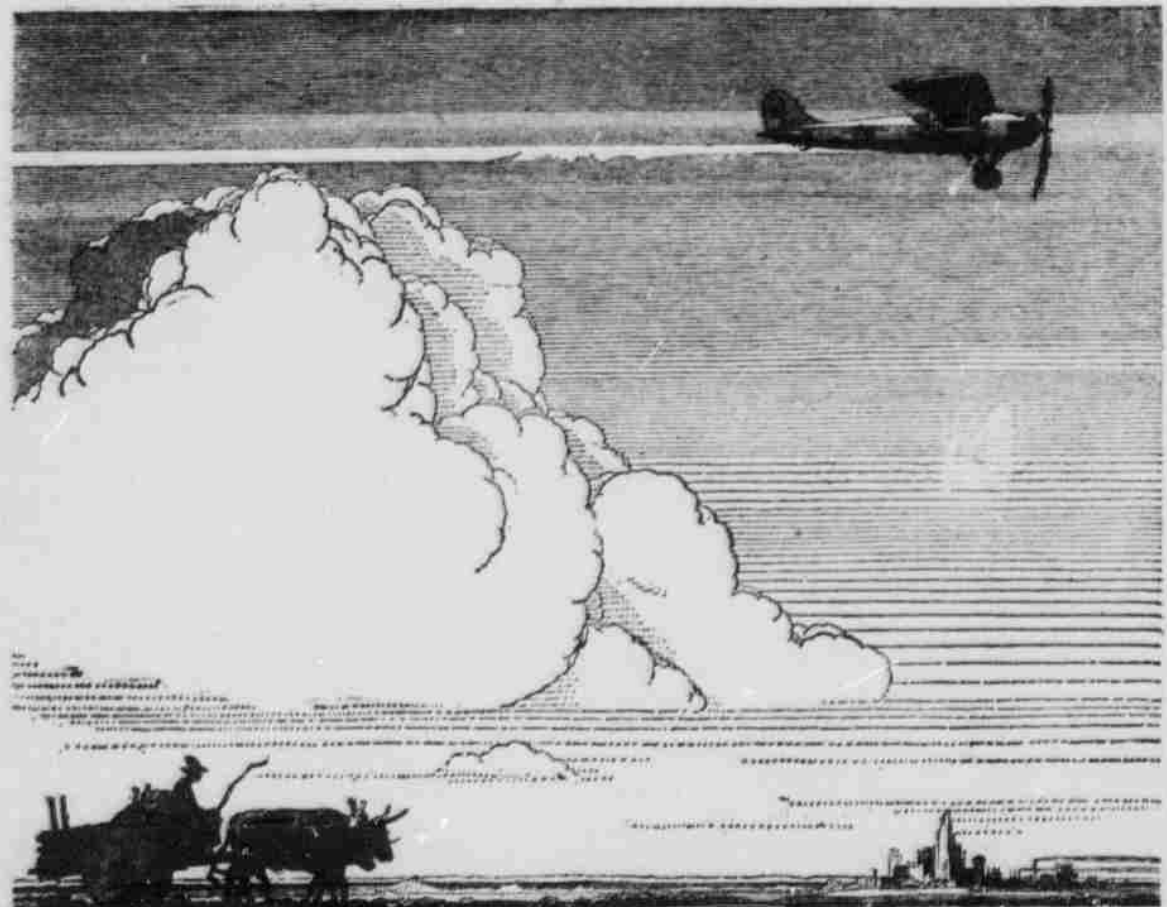
