

COEDS ENTER IN GAGE CONTESTS MONDAY NIGHT

Women's Basketball Games Will Start Feb. 10; Majors Referee.

THREE HUNDRED ENTER Rounds Divided Into Two Classes and Seven Leagues.

Women's intramural basketball tournament starts Monday, Feb. 10. Nearly three hundred women, representing twenty-five groups, will participate in the games.

The tournament will be divided into two classes, class A and class B. Class A in turn will be subdivided into five leagues, and class B into two leagues. A round robin tournament will be run off within each league. The winner of each league will play the winners of the other groups in an elimination tournament in each class. A inter-class topster tournament will follow.

Historical Society Receives Old Medal From North Platte

The state historical society is the recipient of a medal which was unearthed about fifteen miles north of North Platte, Neb. by S. P. Whitaker. The medal, about half again as large as a silver dollar, was struck off in 1868. It commemorated the founding of Methodism a hundred years before. Though somewhat corroded, the stampings, "The World Is My Parish" and "Founder of Methodism" and distinguishable on the face side of the token.
