#### Dual Meet Will Be Held in Afternoon Instead of Evening.

The dual swimming meet between Nebraska and the Kansas Aggies will be held Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock in the Lincoln high school pool, and not in the evening, as was announced in yesterday's Daily Nebraskan.

### CORNHUSKER QUINTET WORKS ON OFFENSIVE

#### Coach Black Sends Squad Through Long Drill On Formations.

Still hot from the seven minute rally staged Wednesday night in pulling a fast one on St. Louis, Coach Charley Black's basketballers hit the net with unusual consistency in practicing offensive plays to be used in the Missouri game in the Coliseum Saturday night.

Working against a defense of freshmen, several combinations passed the ball down the floor to score. Stipsky, Grace, Fisher, Jensen, Conklin and Davey in the forward line, and Hokut, Witte, and Lewandowski at guards, alternated in the practice of scoring formations.

The plays were clicking with precision. Time after time the man coming to the basket had a clear line ahead of him, and plenty of time for his shot. There was no work on defense.

Coach Black indicated that the lineup to start against the Tigers Saturday night might be the same as that started against St. Louis, with Stipsky at center, Jensen and Witte at forwards, and Lewandowski and Hokut at guards.

### OKLAHOMA AGGIES TAKE SHORT LAYOFF

STILLWATER, Okla., Feb. 13.—With their fifty-fourth consecutive dual meet victory tucked under their belts, the national champion Oklahoma Aggie wrestling team will take a short lay off before resuming their campaign for another title this year.

After decisively defeating Paul Keen's Oklahoma university mat crew, Ed Gallagher will not swing his men into action until February 22, when they will engage a combine from Kansas state. Another meet with the University of West Virginia, at Morgantown, March 5, will end the current campaign of the Aggies.

### DEAN THOMPSON TELLS STANDS ON MINOR OFFICES

(Continued from Page 1.) with the Student council's election machinery. Classes May Express Disapproval. "If the general sentiment among classes is opposed to the election of minor offices then they may express their disapproval by failing to hold a mass meeting," Dean Thompson expressed his belief that much could be accomplished in the fostering of student spirit and interest through class meetings, called and handled by class officers. That such meetings might prove unsuccessful was admitted by Dean Thompson.

"Abolition of class officers, as recommended by the Student council, was not refused by the faculty committee on student organizations," continued Dr. Thompson, "but was merely tabled."

Dean Cites Advantages.

Gatherings of the senior class are urged by the Alumni association and the advantages of such meetings were cited to The Nebraskan by the dean of student affairs. If class congregations are impossible and impractical, then the student body has the power to eliminate minor class offices by

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failure to elect officers or to call mass meetings. The Faculty committee on student organizations, of which Dean Thompson is chairman, is made up of the following faculty members: Miss Amanda Heppner, dean of women; Prof. E. F. ### IOWA AGGIES START BASEBALL PRACTICE

#### Ames Has Eight Lettermen Back, With Several Promising Sophs.

AMES, Ia., Feb. 13.—Six major letter men, one minor award winner and several promising sophomores loom as the leading prospects for the Iowa State college baseball team, in the opinion of Coach Noel Workman. Battery candidates will start work Monday while other players will not start until March 1, due to inadequate indoor facilities for practice.

Eight major letter winners of last year's nine were lost to the squad, leaving several gaping holes that will have to be filled by new men. The lack of pitchers will be the chief source of worry to the Cyclone mentor, since only one 1929 regular will return.

The major award winners expected to be on hand for duty are: Eddie Adland, Waterloo, catcher; Clarence Gustafson, Rice Lake, Wis., pitcher; Ralph Towne, Jamaica, and Gibson Huntbatch, Swaledale, infielders; and Gaylord White, Huron, S. D., and Shorty Oldham, Colesburg, outfielders. In addition, Elmer Holtgrewe, Remsen, minor letter man of two years ago, will be available for third base. Both Holtgrewe and Huntbatch, infielders, will be given a trial on the hurling mound, in an endeavor to build a capable pitching corps.
