Ag Club President Names Committee for June Convention.

Newton W. Gaines, Nebraska extension service specialist, spoke at the regular meeting of the University 4-H club, held in Ag hall Thursday evening.

The fore part of the evening was taken up with a short business meeting. President Jess Bilyeu appointed a committee to arrange for a program during the annual boys and girls 4-H club week that will be held in Lincoln June 2 to 7. Those appointed were: Otto Dillon, Erwin Hutchinson, Ella Donaldson, Elmer Young and Harlan Bollman. Another committee consisting of Homer Ingalls, Clarence Norris and Joe Watson was appointed to make plans for a picnic to be held sometime in May.

CHANCELLOR BURNETT HAS VARIETY OF JOBS

(Continued from Page 1.) With the money that is on hand, the chancellor is also a "go-between" between the faculty and the regents. Recommendations are made to the chancellor and if they are passed by him they are in turn presented to the Board of Regents who have final authority in all matters.

"In public relations the chancellor undertakes to maintain good relations and to establish confidence in the university by the public," declared Chancellor Burnett. "In this he is assisted by the faculty and the students. If the students are well behaved, earnest, and studious they promote much good will, but if they are boisterous and indifferent to their studies this good will is lessened. Trips are also made to meet with the alumni. If cordial relations are kept with the alumni they also assist in building up confidence in the university."

The work in public relations is under the direction of the chancellor, also. Prof. R. P. Crawford, professor of agricultural journalism and assistant to the chancellor in public relations is in charge and is assisted by Mr. Lawrence Pike, assistant editor and instructor in journalism. Bulletins and pamphlets as well as facts in regard to the work of the institutions are published and distributed to the public.

"As has been indicated before," the chancellor went on, "the chancellor has general charge of everything connected with the university but his control is thru different organizations. Business is taken care of by Mr. L. E. Gunderson, finance secretary, while the deans of the various colleges have charge of the curricula. The operating superintendent, Mr. L. F. Sexton has control of the physical plant. The dean of student affairs, Dr. T. J. Thompson, and the dean of women, Miss Amanda H. Heppner, have charge of relations with students.

"The budget for next year, commencing July 1, in the amount of \$3,725,000 has been prepared and will be presented to the Board of Regents at their next meeting. The finance committee of this board

will first investigate it and if they pass on it, it then goes to the board of six regents for their final approval. After this is received it is ready to go into effect."

"The budget has been in the process of making for several months," concluded the Chancellor. "A statement of the approximate amount of money available for each department is made known and budgets are prepared with this amount in mind. After they are verified by the deans of the various colleges they are sent to the chancellor and the finance secretary. After approval they are then presented to the regents."

In an eastern university are not the same as the requirements needed to enter Nebraska. High school preparation and an entrance examination in English, which may be taken in your own home town or at the university at the beginning of the school year, are sufficient, while to enter any eastern school, a student must pass an entrance examination which includes examinations on all subjects as well as an intelligence test.

Favor Upper Third. Eastern schools pay more attention to the students who are in the upper third of their class, as well as being more rigid in admittance of students. Carnegie Foundation for Advancement of Teaching is sponsoring a test for students, their mental hygiene as well as their scholarship. This experiment is to be carried on for seven years.

Many practical topics were discussed at the deans' institutes. Some were: self-government, orientation, sororities and what they can do, and dormitories, which was very interesting especially since Nebraska plans to build dormitories, according to Miss Heppner. Miss Mary Yost of Leland Stanford led the discussion of dormitories.

Discuss Dormitories. Miss Heppner visited many universities where new dormitories are being built. Some were Northwestern, Ann Arbor, Cornell, and the International House at Columbia. The dormitories at Cornell was recently given by Mr. and Mrs. Balch, former students of the university. It houses 317 women. Cornell is one of the few universities where single rooms in the dormitories are possible. All women either live at home, places where they work for their board and room, sororities, or dormitories. No girls live in rooming houses.

The dormitories are governed by a social director with the assistance of four or five sponsors, who are university students. There

is at least one sponsor for each floor of the dormitory.

The dormitories at Ann Arbor consist of a four unit house and accommodates 450 women. Both Cornell and Ann Arbor dormitories are the type that Nebraska wishes to build.

At the opening luncheon Dr. Ralph W. Sockman of New York, spoke on "Morals in a Machine Age," and at the joint meeting of the Personal and Vocational Guidance association and the Department of Superintendence National Education association, Mr. Hould Hudgriss of Chicago talked on "The Business World Looks at the College Product."

The Department of Superintendence National Education association will hold another convention in June, which all deans, principals and teachers will be able to attend. Miss Ruth Pyrtle, principal of Bancroft school, is the national president.

This convention had the largest attendance of any convention. There are a thousand members.
