

LINCOLN MENTOR IS SELECTED TO PILOT FRESHMEN

W. H. Browne Will Act as Yearling Football Coach.

FOLLOWS JOHN RHODES

Takes Charge of Varsity Baseball and Frosh Basketball.

W. H. Browne, Lincoln high school coach for eight years, has signed a contract to take the place of "Choppy" Rhodes, who has accepted a position as director of athletics at the University of Wyoming. Adolph Lewandowski and Dutch Witte have been mentioned as possibilities to succeed him at the prep school.

Browne will have charge of the varsity baseball team as head coach, and will serve as freshmen coach in football and basketball.

Sets Record.

During the eight years he held the reins at Lincoln high, Browne established a record which may be favorably compared with that of any high school coach. His football teams have won five state championships, winning 67 games, losing 3, and tying 2 of the 72 games played. The state titles were won in 1922, 1925, 1927, 1928, and 1929.

In basketball, the record is but little less impressive. 185 games have been played. Of these, 141 were won by the Brownmen. A state championship was added to the list of triumphs in 1927.

Browne was elected to the presidency of the Nebraska State High School Athletic association at a recent meeting. The fact that he was sufficiently popular to gain this office even though his teams have been beating other high school teams is indicative of his popularity.

HUSKER MERMEN WIN BIG SIX SWIM MEET

Old Records Are Broken by Mockler, Chaloupka, Hestbeck.

IOWA STATE IS SECOND

Breaking four conference records, Coach Rudy Vogeler's Cornhusker swimmers defeated Iowa State, 42-39, to win the Big Six championship in the conference meet Friday in Kansas City. Kansas, Kansas Aggies and Oklahoma scored 25, 8 and 5 points respectively. Missouri had no entries.

Chaloupka, Hestbeck and Mockler were the Nebraska men who established new records in the individual events, while the team composed of Mockler, Chaloupka, Dille and Sutherland shaved some time off the medley relay record, which was formerly held by the Nebraska team.

Mockler Breaks Record.
Chaloupka pared 7 1-2 seconds from his old record of 3 minutes 2 seconds in the 200 yard breast stroke, when he swam the distance in 2 minutes, 54 5-10 seconds. Mockler, also a former record

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holder, took some time from his old record of 1 minute 58 8-10 seconds, when he paddled the 150 yards in 1 minute 57 7-10 seconds.

Hestbeck distance man, was the third record breaker. He knocked 9 4-10 seconds off the old 440 record, set by Butler of Iowa, of 6 minutes 21 seconds. Hestbeck negotiated the 440 in 6 minutes 11 6-10 seconds.

Medley Wins.
The medley relay team broke its old record of 3:39.4 by winning the event in 3:38.5.
