BIG JIM BAUSCH GETS 14 POINTS AS MEET'S STAR

Nebraska Cops Grand Slam In High Sticks; Lamson Wins Both Events.

SMUTNY TAKES DASHES

Hokuf Heaves Javelin 181 Feet, 11 Inches for First Place.

Nebraska's track squad edged out a 75 1/2 to 55 1/2 victory over Kansas in a meet held yesterday morning on the stadium track. The outcome was in doubt until the next to last event, the mile relay, had been run.

Jim Bausch, Kansas all around athlete, led the individual scoring with fourteen points, the rewards for firsts being in the shot put and the pole vault, a second in the javelin, and a third in the discus.

Nebraska scored one grand slam—in the high hurdles when Lamson, White and Thompson finished in the order named. Kansas also cleaned up one event, winning the discus with Ward, Thornhill and J. Bausch whirling the platter distances varying from 135 feet to 144 feet.

Tomson has Trouble.

Lamson came through with ten points, winning his specialties, the high and low hurdles, without being pushed particularly hard. In the broad jump, Cobe Tomson, the dependable kangaroo, had trouble hitting the takeoff board and failed to qualify, leaving the event in the hands of Gray and Craig, who scored first and third.

Smutny was good for two firsts, one in the hundred and one in the two-hundred, but he split points in the hundred with Sickle of Kansas, who finished in dead heat with him.

Etherton and Garvey finished a wide fifteen yards ahead of Hinshaw, Kansas miler. Fuhrodt and Ostergard finished first and second in the quarter, with plenty to spare. Ostergard had more work to do during the morning, being entered in the half, which he won, and in the mile relay, where he performed creditably. Fuhrodt also ran in the mile relay and made his contribution to the lead held by the Nebraska team when the race was over.

Hokuf Takes Javelin.

Fortune, Kansas two miler, beat Griffin and Garvey to the tape. Ossiian cleared the bar in the pole vault at 12 feet, 6 inches, to stay in the running with Jim Bausch, but went out on 12 feet, 9 inches.

Hugh Rhea fell seven inches short of Jim Bausch's mark in the shot put, and the insurance company's employes won that event with a heave of 45 feet, 11 inches.

Hokuf sailed the javelin 181 feet, 11 inches to beat Jim Bausch out of a first in the event.

Richardson, Once Nebraskan Chief, Says Journalism Experience Big Help.

Editor's Note: This is another of a series of articles regarding former editors of the Daily Nebraskan.

Paul Richardson, a former editor of the Daily Nebraskan, and now sales promotion manager of Pierce-Thelps, inc., wholesale radio distributors located in Philadelphia, Pa., recently replied to a letter sent him by the present staff questioning the value of his experience as editor of The Nebraskan.

Mr. Richardson says in his letter: "I think that of all student activities a man derives a great deal more benefit from work on college publications than anything else. In the first place, you learn to write. I don't believe there is any one thing in business that is so valuable as the ability to write rapidly and clearly. I am not speaking of the advertising business primarily, but of any business.

Business Training Good.

"In addition to the writing one receives on the editorial side of a publication, I think that the training on the business side is equally as good. An advertising solicitor on a student publication meets retail merchants and many other business men and undoubtedly gains a lot of valuable experience."

In speaking of courses taken at the university the former editor said, "I think that the training as editor of The Daily Nebraskan has been very valuable to me. I also feel that the journalism courses at the University of Nebraska are also extremely helpful.

I consider Mr. Lawrence exceedingly well qualified for his position and look back with the most pleasant memories to my contacts with him. In addition to the courses in journalism, I believe that literature courses, such as comparative literature courses formerly offered by Dean Buck, are very valuable."

In answering a question regarding the college newspaper of today Mr. Richardson says, "I have no criticism to offer regarding the college newspapers of today. You may be interested to know that
