Forty-Four Engineering Students Spend Six Weeks at Survey Camp

Camp life started June 7 and will end July 19. The course is a requirement in the department of civil engineering.

This year the young men are at work on a practical hydro-electric power plant project. They are making a triangulation survey of the Platte valley and foothills east of the river from the state fisheries to Waterloo. One of the ravines on the north bank of the Platte near South Bend will be surveyed for a reservoir site to hold water in storage and to act as a control reservoir for the hydroelectric plant. The water will be conveyed from the reservoir to the water turbines through penstocks. It will be returned to the Platte through an open ditch tail race.

June 22 and July 13 were set aside as official visiting days. Camp life, while rigorous, is not devoted entirely to work. Tournaments in swimming, baseball, fishing and horseshoe pitching have been arranged. One evening a week a moving picture is shown
