

SUMMER SCHOOL SHOWS INCREASE OVER LAST YEAR

Sessions Run Under New Plan; 2,665 Receive University Hours.

TWO COURSES OFFERED

Teachers College Draws 1,254 Students; 112 Study Accounting.

Summer school sessions at the University of Nebraska this summer drew an increased enrollment over last year, figures released today showed.

The school was conducted on the six-nine plan this summer, when two separate courses, one of six weeks duration and one of nine weeks duration, were offered. Respective numbers of credit hours were given in the two courses, which closed August 7.

Was New Plan.

The plan was a new departure in the summer school work, as in previous years but one session was offered. In 1929, the summer school worked on a nine week plan, and in 1928 and former years, on a six weeks basis.

Prof. R. D. Moritz, summer school director who sponsored the new plan, recently sent letters to university professors, asking their opinions of the plan and to determine from their contacts with the students whether or not the plan was satisfactory. He also asked them for suggestions which might be used to improve the next session, relative to the type and variety of courses offered, length of sessions, entertainment and social activities for students, library facilities, etc.

Increase Shown.

Enrollment this summer showed a slight increase over 1929, when 2,614 students were present. This year there were 2,665 who received university credit for their summer school work. In other years, field courses were contained in the regular summer school work, and the students were given university credit, but this year that work was handled by the extension department. In addition to these students who were not counted, there were

a number of students enrolled at the summer coaching school, taking a course in physical education, and 112 students in accounting, who were not given university credit for their work.

The teachers college had the

largest enrollment, as usual, with 1,254 students, an increase of forty-five over 1929. The college of dentistry had the smallest enrollment, with eleven students taking summer work there.

AGGIES PREPARE FOR HUSKERS BY SEVERE TRAINING

HAVE SMALL ADVANTAGE

Texas Team Drilling Hard For Nebraska Clash Here Oct. 4.

Meeting three times a day, twice for actual training and once for "skull practice," Texas A. & M. is leaving no stone unturned in preparation for their battle with Nebraska at Lincoln, October 4. The Aggies will have a little advantage over the Nebraska team as they will have seen some action in their game with Southwestern university, the week previous to the Nebraska game.

Seven lettermen, headed by

"Bull" Floyd, fullback, will be back in the fold. Floyd is the only letterman returning to the backfield, the other men who earned their letters last year being line-men. Abbey, Cristian, Zanol, Moulden, Magrill and Tracey are the men returning to the line from last year's team and Coach Matty Bell is enthusiastic over forward wall prospects. The backfield is causing most of the worry and attention will be concentrated on the ball-huggers for the first few workouts.

Special Interest.

The Nebraska-Texas Aggie game will prove of special interest to Nebraska fans due to the fact that the present head coach of the Cornhusker team, D. X. Bible, was the tutor of the team from the Lone Star state before transferring to Nebraska last year.

The Texas Aggies will be the second team from the southwest to appear on stadium sod, Southern Methodist university coming here for the opening game last year which ended in a scoreless tie. The game will enable Cornhusker fans to get another glimpse of the type of football in the southwest and brings one of the strongest teams in this section of the country to Lincoln.

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
