

### SPORT PROGRAM IS PLANNED BY WOMEN'S GROUP

Director Asks All Girls to Enter Competition to Start Soon.

GREEKS, BARBS INVITED

Speedball, Paddle Tennis, Hockey, Soccer Are First on List.

With the school bell playing a merry reveille in the ears of Nebraskans, the Women's Athletic Association, sponsors of the girls' intramural sports programs has submitted its outline of athletic tournaments to be held during 1930-1931.

Miss Clarice McDonald, director of women's intramural sports has issued a statement urging all the old as well as new university women to compete in as many sports as they can possibly find time for. "Last year was the biggest year for intramural sports we have ever had," she said, "and I am hoping and counting on 1930 completely eclipsing last year's record."

To Start September 25. The fall program includes speedball, paddle tennis, hockey, soccer, Nebraska ball, and bowling. Speedball tournaments begin Monday, September 29. No knowledge of any of the sports is required to participate; only interest and the love of fun are necessary qualities. Each organization, whether it be a Greek letter organization or an organized independent group may enter participants in any of the sports. For each girl entered, the group will receive a certain number of points. These, together with whatever points a group may get for winning a first, second, or third place are accredited to that group, and in the spring the grand total is determined and the winners of the cup and plaque awarded for first and second prizes are announced. In addition, winners of each sport are given skins with which they may adorn their club rooms.

It is sponsored by the Word-smith chapter of Sigma Upsilon, a national literary fraternity, and is published with the aid of the University of Nebraska. Prairie Schooner, which is issued quarterly: February, May, August, and November, is generally composed of stories, poems, and sketches.

### NEW COMMANDANT OF R. O. T. C. UNIT HERE

Lt. Col. William T. Oury Is Graduate of Nebraska; Jewett Leaves.

Lieut. Col. William T. Oury, who succeeds Lieut. Col. F. F. Jewett as commander of the University of Nebraska R. O. T. C. unit, assumed his duties here Sept. 15.

Colonel Oury was graduated from the University of Nebraska in 1897. For the past four years he has been federal instructor to the national guard with quarters at Philadelphia. During the world war his gallantry in action during the Mountauson drive brought about the decoration with the silver bar citation. He is a graduate of the field and general staff school and of the army war college. In 1898 he was captain of the First Nebraska volunteer infantry force to the Philippines and he resigned his commission there to accept a regular commission in the United States army.

Jewett in Maryland. Lieut. Col. F. F. Jewett, Nebraska R. O. T. C. commander for the past five years, is now stationed at Fort Howard, Md., where he was transferred Sept. 15. His wife and young son, Charles, accompanied him to Fort Howard, while his son Robert remained here to continue his college career. Fort Howard is a regular army post, located sixteen miles from Baltimore and surrounded on three sides by Chesapeake bay. Present indications are that he will be second in command at his new quarters.

Several other personnel changes have taken place in the military department. Capt. Russel Skinner was transferred Sept. 15, to Vancouver Barracks, Wash., where he is to command a company at that post.

Scott New Member. Capt. Walter T. Scott is a new member of the military department instructional staff. He has arrived and his studies will begin with the opening of the regular fall term. Captain Scott comes from Fort Benning, Ga. Another member of the cadet regiment instructional staff, Capt. Earl C. Fiegel, will be unable to return to his work at the present due to a larynx tumor operation.
