Bible, Nebraska's football coach, has chosen thirty-six men to make up his 1930 varsity Cornhusker squad that will start nine games this season with such teams as Texas A. and M., Pittsburgh, Kansas and Missouri, in a schedule that has all the earmarks of being plenty tough. The nubbin squad will hold thirty-two men in reserve.

Bible said, "We can not spend time on a lot of men. It is quality that counts and it is quality that must be had. There was no guess work in selecting the varsity squad for the men were observed in freshman football, spring practice and this fall."

The Pittsburgh and Kansas games have been getting a lot of publicity and interest centers around them. But the Cornhuskers had better not underestimate Texas A. and M., Oklahoma and Ames. The Texas farmers live together in dormitories, eat together at training tables, and have a spirit that compares with that of Notre Dame. The southern team has a strong, experienced line and, though its backfield has seen little service, it is liable to make up for physical unpreparedness with fire and determination. No team will underestimate Nebraska and the huskers had better be careful.

### Improvement Demanded.

In practice scrimmages so far the play has been mediocre. Texas and Pittsburgh do not play mediocre football. One man spoke of the Nebraska squad as coasting and explained that now that registration is over and routine school under way the machine ought to reach perfection more speedily. In spite of this, with men like Hokuf, Rhea, Koster, Maasdam, Greenberg, and Broadstone in the line, tried and found all pounds of fire and dynamite, and with Mathis, Young, Perry and Frahm and their kind, who don't know their own strength or speed in the backfield, the opposition better bring along plenty of men.

- 5:45—Signal drill, full speed.
- 5:50—Kickoff practice so every man goes down with kickoff once and meets it once.

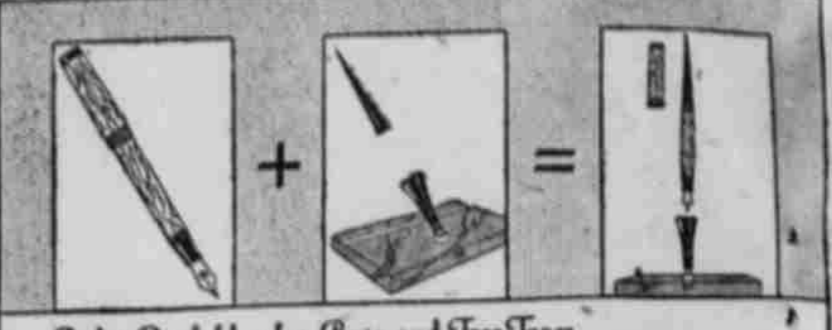
