All-University Meet to Start Monday; Three Races

Scheduled. Pall intramural sports program will start immediately, announced Rudy Vogeler, director of intramural sports, yesterday. Soccer will occupy the time of the fraternities for the next few weeks and an all university tennis tournament will start next Monday. sides these two sports Vogeler an-nounced that three two mile races will be run between candidates

from the whole university.

Thirty-seven entrants were received for the tennis tournament and these entrants include men from non-fraternity groups as well as fraternities. Pairings will be made immediately and the tourna-ment will start Monday. Notices will be sent to all entrants as to when and who they will play.

Award Medals.

The two mile races are also for parbs as well as fraternity men and will start in a very short time. Everyone in the university is ell-gible for the races except letternen in cross country. Six medals will be awarded to men having the highest average in the three races. gold medal will be given for first place, two silver medals for second and third, and three bronze medals for fourth, fifth, and sixth. These medals are given on a basis of the average of three races.

Races Scheduled Tuesday. All the races will be run o Tuesday at 5 o'clock unless it rains. In this case the races will be run on the following Thursday at 5 o'clock. Dates for the three races are Oct. 14, Oct. 21 and Oct. 28. All men who wish to run are urged to come out and practice immediately to get into some kind of shape for the runs.
