Movies are Used in New History Course
Extension Division Offers Instruction Featuring Yale Chronicles.

Class correspondence course in American history, supplemented by the showing of historical motion pictures of fifteen important episodes in American history, is now being offered by the university extension division. One, two or three hours' credit may be earned according to the number of lessons read and the number of references.

Events Depicted.
The motion pictures are the Yale Chronicles of America, produced by Yale university and distributed by the university extension division, depicting some of the outstanding events affecting the history of this country. The Chronicles are based upon "The Chronicles of America," a history of America in fifty volumes.

The primary purpose of these photoplays is to provide a new apparatus to aid in the teaching of history. The photoplays are now being shown in different parts of the country by Americanization groups, community clubs, civic and historical clubs, and other similar groups. They are also being used to aid in instruction in grade schools, high schools and colleges.

Miss Lyman in Charge.
The class work in the course will consist of attendance at the photodramas and lectures, written exercises, and the examination. The correspondence work in the course will be handled as are other correspondence courses. Miss Blanche Lyman, instructor in history, will have charge of the course.

CIVIL ENGINEERS FROM IOWA STATE VISIT ST. LOUIS
AMES, Ia., Sept. 30.—Twenty-five senior civil engineers at Iowa State college left here yesterday by bus for St. Louis on their annual inspection trip, which is required for graduation.

In charge of W. E. Galligan, professor of water supply and sanitary engineering, they will visit various engineering works en route, stopping at Cedar Rapids, Keokuk, Jacksonville, Ill., and Alton, Ill. Bridge construction, hydroelectric developments, sewage disposal and airport design are the main items being studied.

While at St. Louis the students will attend the fall meeting of the American Society of Civil Engineers, of which Anson Marston, dean of engineering, is past president. This trip of one week takes the place of the Chicago trip heretofore made in the spring.

INTRAMURALS TO START AT ONCE STATES VOGELER

Fall Sports Program Will Commence With Soccer For Fraternities.

PLAN TENNIS TOURNEY
All-University Meet to Start Monday; Three Races Scheduled.

Fall intramural sports program will start immediately, announced Rudy Vogeler, director of intramural sports, yesterday. Soccer will occupy the time of the fraternities for the next few weeks and an all university tennis tournament will start next Monday. Besides these two sports Vogelger announced that three two mile races will be run between candidates from the whole university.

Thirty-seven entrants were received for the tennis tournament and these entrants include men from non-fraternity groups as well as fraternities. Pairings will be made immediately and the tournament will start Monday. Notices will be sent to all entrants as to when and who they will play.

Award Medals.
The two mile races are also for bars as well as fraternity men and will start in a very short time. Everyone in the university is eligible for the races except lettermen in cross country. Six medals will be awarded to men having the highest average in the three races. A gold medal will be given for first place, two silver medals for second and third, and three bronze medals for fourth, fifth, and sixth. These medals are given on a basis of the average of three races.

Races Scheduled Tuesday.
All the races will be run on Tuesday at 5 o'clock unless it rains. In this case the races will be run on the following Thursday at 5 o'clock. Dates for the three races are Oct. 14, Oct. 21 and Oct. 28. All men who wish to run are urged to come out and practice immediately to get into some kind of shape for the runs.

By these all-university events Director Vogeler is attempting to reach all the men of the university. Mr. Vogeler hopes that bars, as well as fraternity men will respond for the events, thus bringing all the groups of the school into contact.

BY a rally being important it is not meant that no attention will be paid to the other games. The idea of having the three major rallies was adopted because a rally loses its effect if the same routine is gone through for every game.

The Innocents, Corn Cobs, Mortar boards and Tassels have a real job ahead of them. They must develop plenty of pep and fire for the big games of the year but must also be able to keep this enthusiasm under control.
