Kelly also attacked the argument that military education trains and develops leadership. The leadership developed by yelling commands at students and having them obeyed is not the type

Chairman Hunt maintained that one of the purposes of education was to free the student of prejudices. This, he declared, cannot be done in an education system which forces students to take military drill and to accept the militarists side of the argument on the use of war as a means of settling international disputes. Hunt also quoted from several authorities including Gen. Robert E. Lee and Presiden Theodore Roosevelt statements

disprovingk military education. Military training is the worst possible preparation for civil life, said the confederate commander, according to Hunt. Roosevelt said Hunt, disproved his son's choice of a military academy as a prep school saying that, "It does not develop the individuality and courage which are necessary for life in a democratic country."
