

### JAYHAWK-HUSKER DUAL MEET WILL BE HELD MONDAY

Scarlet Doped Victors in Lawrence Contest by Slight Margin.

K. U. HAS STRONG TEAM Winner Will Be Favorite in Conference Battle to Be Held Here.

Lawrence, Kansas dispatches emphasize the importance that is being placed by Big Six track followers on the Nebraska-Kansas university dual meet to be held here Monday afternoon, May 11, at Lawrence. The winner of this under and turf battle will reign as favorite to capture the conference outdoor title here May 22 and 23.

Coach Schmitz's men are doped to hold a slight margin of advantage over the Jays because of the Husker triumph in the Big Six indoor earlier in the spring. Coach Brutus Hamilton's Jayhawkers are made up of a goodly portion of his 1930 conference championship squad, however, and he has developed a number of strong sophomores.

Strong in Hurdles. Lamson, Smutny, Petz and White along with the Carroll twins twinkle over the barriers for Nebraska. But in Ramond Flick and Bernard Criddle, sophomores, K. U. has two swift lads over the timbers. Flick has finished second, third or fourth in all the major relay games this season and Criddle won the low hurdles at the Rice relays.

The shot should be all Nebraska's as far as first place is concerned. Hugh Rhea has created a monopoly in that event. In the shot, discus and javelin, however, Kansas has a group of men who are expected to bore in for their share of the points. These include Earl Fay, Earl Walton, Kurt Reisen, Clyde Coffman, Ross Bryan, Jay Meyer, and Ross.

After engagements with the Kansas club at Lawrence Friday and Saturday the Oklahoma diamond squad will move north to Lincoln. The southern nine has a promising record which claims the distinction of having permitted but six earned runs off its pitching staff in a total of 58 innings played in six games so far this year.

Brown's Cornhuskers have had a desultory season so far. Rain forestalled the series opener at Iowa City late in April. The Cyclones administered a pair of defeats here a week ago and the Maryville Teachers whitewashed the Nebraskans 6 to 0 in Missouri last Friday.

The Sooners are pointing for the baseball title in hopes to oust Nebraska from its present position at the top of the battle for the all sports championship of the Big Six.
