PROGRAM IS EXPANDED

(Continued from Page 1.) not detrimental to student authority. He compared it to the United States government in asserting that it, likewise, was restricted in a similar sense.

Power Clause No Hinderance. "The limited power clause will not hinder or reduce the scope of student rule if they act with discretion, judgment and consideration on all matters which come to their attention."

"Furthermore, it can and will, if the members of the council act in such manner, do a great deal of good and I am for it."

Dick Devereaux, newly elected president of Innocents society like Chancellor Burnett and Professor Aylesworth also believes that it is a great step and will prove a success.

If the student body signifies its approval of this new student code at today's election the new constitution will go into immediate effect and will apply directly to student council elections which take place within the next few days.

Obstacles Encountered. Members of the council, in their work on this new document for nearly a year, have had to overcome several serious obstacles before presenting it to popular student suffrage.

In declaring that the new constitution merits student support, Edwin Faulkner said that it clarifies the present situation relative to the interrelationships of extra-curricular activities.

The party will meet in Berlin on July 7, 1931, in the lobby of the Hotel Central. The program has been arranged specifically for making a survey of soviet industrial and agricultural economy, and of the five year plan.

The itinerary, which allows thirty-five days in Russia, will include Berlin, Moscow, Leningrad, Novogrod, state farms at Verblud, Rostov, Kharkov, and Kiev. The tour ends August 13.

WINTER WHEAT GIVEN NAME OF 'CHEYENNE'

'Nebraska No. 50' Renamed For County Raising Most in Country.

Nebraska's new winter wheat, heretofore called Nebraska No. 50, has been named Cheyenne, Dr. T. A. Kieselbach of the agricultural college says.

Cheyenne wheat was developed at the agricultural college under the direction of Dr. Kieselbach. It is a selection from standard hard red winter wheat.

In 1928, 29 and 30 it averaged three and one-half bushel per acre or 14 percent more than Turkey red wheat the Nebraska experiment station.

Four hundred & eighty bushels of the Cheyenne wheat were distributed last fall in small lots to thirty-eight different farmers for increase this year.
