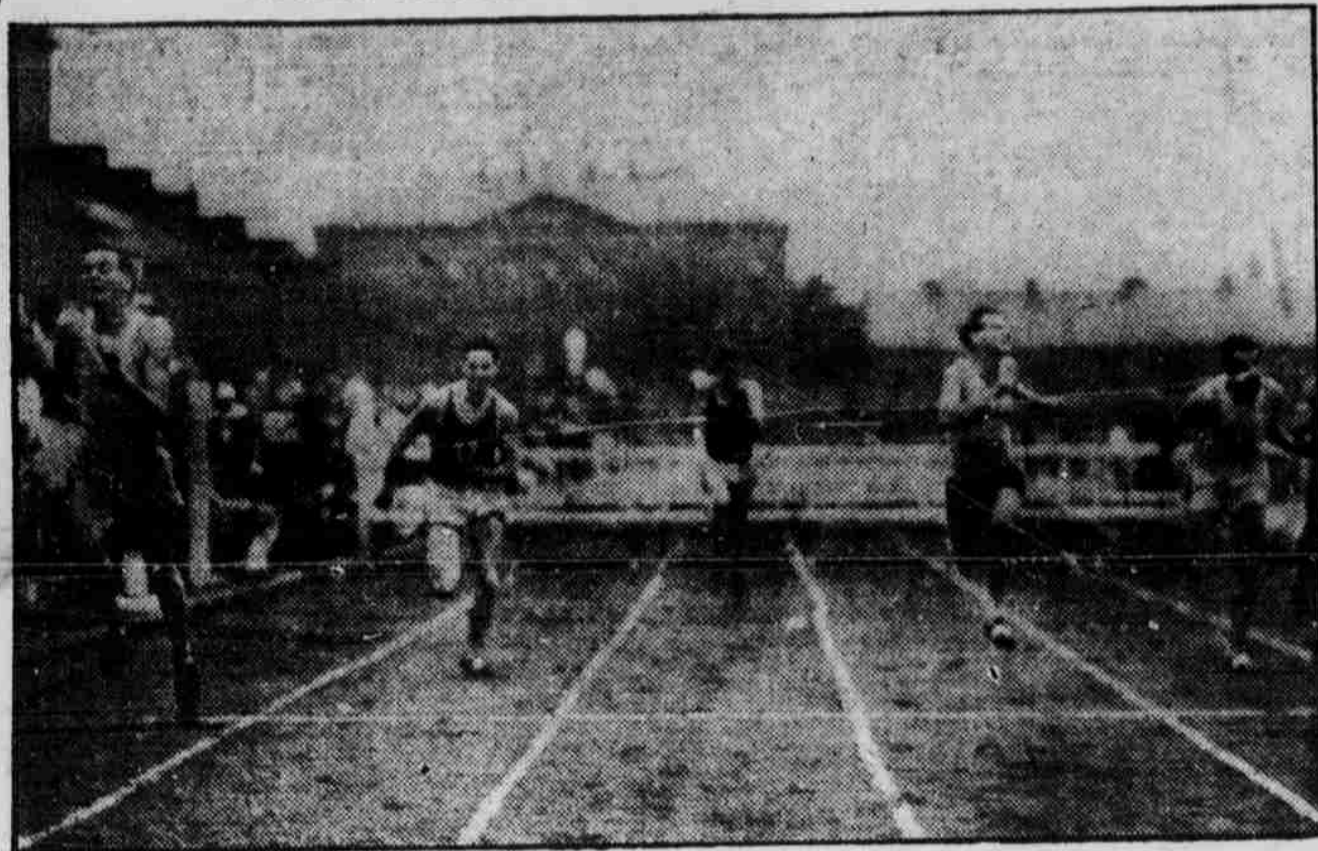


PERCY BEARD BREAKS HURDLE RECORD

TALK ON RURAL EDUCATION

Authorities Tell What Is Wrong With Little Red Schoolhouse.

A governor, an editor and two federal educational authorities told the National Education association what is wrong with the little red schoolhouse and some of the ways to correct it, at the national convention held in Los Angeles last week.

Governor Dern of Utah said education "must play an important part in the development of agricultural marketing and fathom a more equitable way in the division of school monies."

Consolidated schools, said Clarence Poe, editor of a Raleigh, N. C., magazine, must be kept in the country and not verge on city limits. He said he believed the "school of tomorrow" will be the "little capital of a community republic" with rural districts defining their own boundaries and "integrating themselves about the schools as centers of life."

Better qualified teachers and more adequate supervision are needed," Agnes Samuelson, Des Moines, Ia., educator, suggested.

A rural school supervisor for every state was advocated by Chloë C. Baldrige, Lincoln, director of rural education for the state of Nebraska.

 ing the same period of time last year. Salaries in Nebraska are less than those of a year ago, according to the report, and a larger proportion of students who are preparing to teach probably will not obtain positions this year.

The study of the teaching situation as made by Director Batson was based upon the following questions:

What percent of the people enrolled in your bureau have received appointments up to June 1?

How does this compare with the percent of appointments at the same date last year?

What is the status of the salaries paid this year as compared with a year ago?

Do you anticipate that there will be a larger proportion of your students who are preparing to teach that will not obtain positions this year as compared to a year ago?
