

# BIBLEMEN TEAR THRU FRESHMEN

### Two Varsity Teams Score Three Touchdowns Against Yearling Squad in Thirty Minutes of Fast Football Yesterday Afternoon.

### PAUL AND BAUER ACCOUNT FOR TRIO MARKERS

### Veteran Backs Behind Old Linesmen Cross Twice in Early Minutes Sophomore Backs Thrown in With Frsh Line Net Another.

Meeting the fresh for the first time this season, the Cornhuskers displayed much fire and pep throughout the thirty minutes of scrimmage. Using a strong running attack coupled with an aerial attack that could not be stopped, the Huskers look as though they are well prepared for the South Dakota tilt Saturday.

Altho the fresh were unable to stop the varsity, they were given considerable help in the last few minutes of scrimmage when Steve Hokus came to the rescue, and got seven consecutive tackles from the fullback position.

### Paul Scores First Marker.

Opening the scrimmage found Paul, Penney, Brown, and Kreizinger in the backfield with McPherson, Justice, Koester, Rhea, Gilbert, Schmidt, and Peltz in the line. Receiving the ball on the kickoff, the varsity started the game with a bang. Paul, and Kreizinger alternated in carrying the ball the length of the field. Paul going over from the five yard line on a cutback thru the left side of the line. Paul failed to add the extra point.

The fresh chose to kickoff, and Paul received the ball on the 15-yard line, returning to the 25-yard line. Penney squeezed thru the line for a nice run of twenty yards. Kreizinger hit the line for nine yards. A spinner play Kreizinger to Mathis was successful for a gain of fifteen yards. Mathis then broke loose for ten yards, and the ball was resting on the 10-yard line. Paul took the ball thru the right side of the line for another touchdown. Kreizinger added the extra point with Mathis holding.

At this point, Coach Bible sent in another team. Masterson, Boswell, Bauer, and Sauer composed the backfield. In the line was Jay, Ely, O'Brien, Nesmith, Adams, Debus, and Hulbert. This combination worked very nicely, and it was not long until Sauer, Masterson, and Bauer had lugged the pigskin to the ten yard line. ### Thirteen Men Work Under Schulte as Season Approaches.

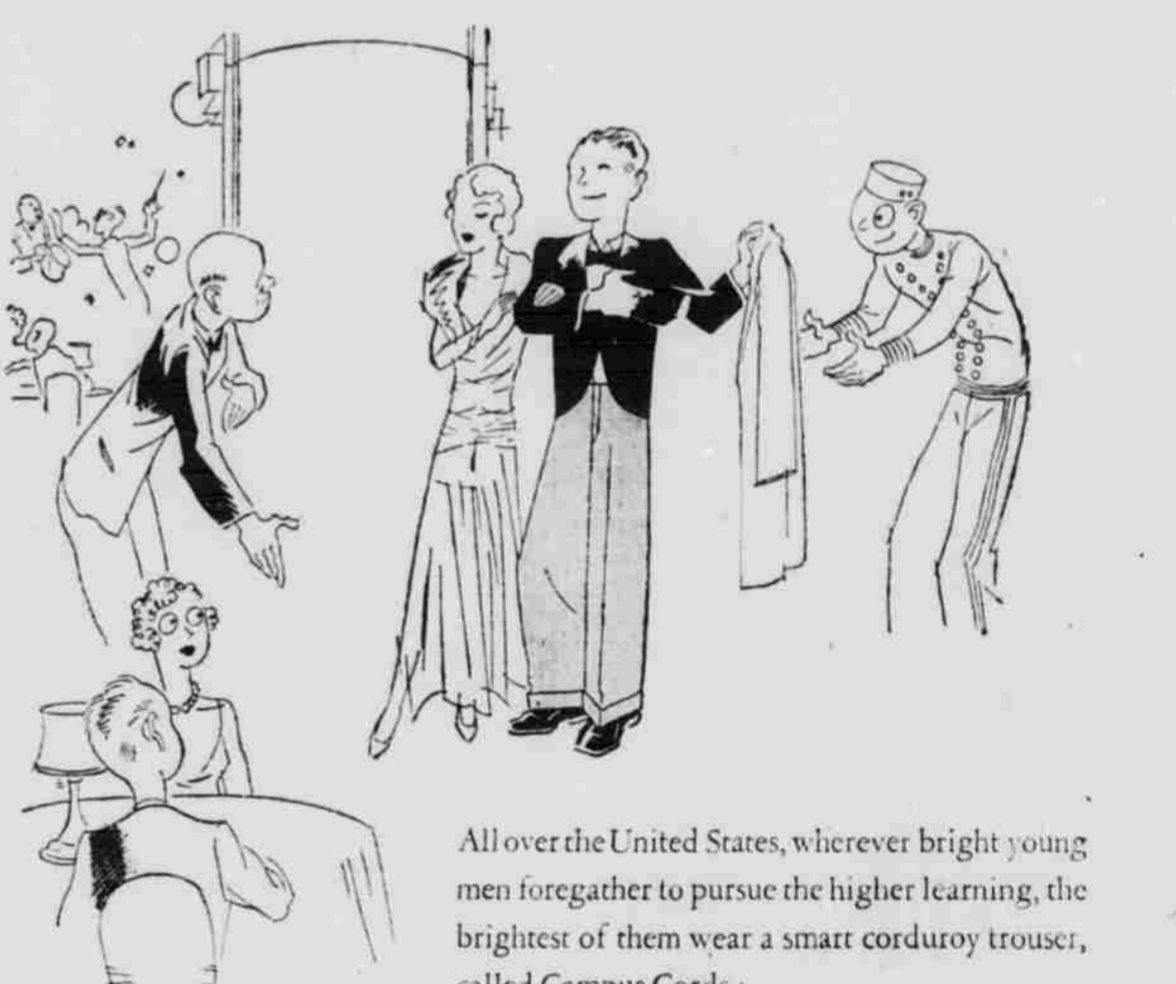

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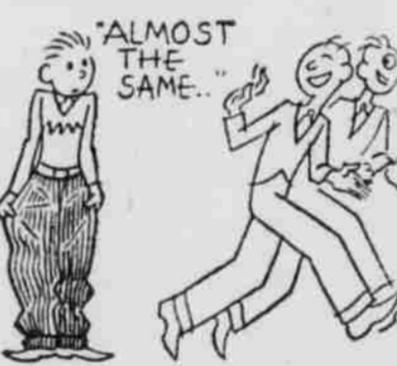
