the planet a general lecture was given by Prof. Collins. Tho the sky was a bit "hazy" the great ringed sphere showed bright and clear. The planet is eighty-four times the earth's surface and the outer rings, estimated to measure approximately 11,000 and 17,000 miles in breadth, appeared as one, while the third ring, dark in color is said never to be visible except with the largest in-
