OPPOSES DARWIN THEORY

Cambridge Biologist Thinks Evolution Takes Place In Cells of Egg.

CNS.—Challenging certain phases of the Darwinian theory, Professor J. B. S. Haldane, Cambridge university biologist and biochemist, this week expressed the belief that evolution takes place entirely within egg cells, rather than in fully developed plants and animals. As a guest of scientists at the University of California at Los Angeles, he told of his experiments with egg cells which, he said, have led him to the conclusion that evolutionary changes, rather than being the result of purely environmental influences, occur within the chromosomes and genes of egg cells.

STUDENT CONGRESS DISAPPROVES ROTC

Delegates to Chicago Meet Pass Resolutions for Abolishment.

Abolishment of reserve officers' training camps on college campuses was recommended in a resolution passed by delegates to the student congress against war held in Chicago during the Christmas holidays. The congress passed a resolution demanding immediate reinstatement of Milton Galatski, student at Lindbloom high school, Chicago, who was expelled for refusing to attend a meeting held under the auspices of the R. O. T. C.

Another resolution asked for elimination of military displays at graduation exercises. "The R. O. T. C." one resolution warned, "is an integral part of the country's war machine and method of disseminating jingoistic propaganda."

Students were urged not only to oppose the R. O. T. C., but to join campus organizations and "seek to demoralize them from within." The 650 delegates were from sixty-seven colleges in twenty-nine states, Canada and Cuba. No Nebraska students attended the congress.

HOME EC AVAILABLE FOR CITY STUDENTS

Department to Offer Four Courses on Main Campus Next Semester.

In order to make home economics available to students of the city campus four courses are being offered for the second semester on the city campus.

Miss Margaret Fedde, chairman of the department of home economics said concerning this arrangement, "Many young women have a desire to take courses along this line but find it inconvenient to go to the agricultural campus for this purpose."

Besides the four courses to be offered on the city campus next semester, Miss Fedde pointed out that there are a number of courses
