Missouri, with four wins and three losses still is very much in the money in the title fight, and this week is to meet two Big Six opponents. Friday they journey to Ames and Saturday appear on the coliseum floor against Nebraska. On paper it would appear that the Tigers should come out of these battles unscathed, but it must be remembered that they are a poor road team, having chalked up all of those three losses on foreign courts. They previously took the Iowans into camp, and defeated Nebraska 37 to 33. These are the only four games in the conference race this week.

#### HUSKER TRACKSTERS DEFEAT MINNESOTA

Schulte's Track Team Win First Meet of Season 68 to 36.

In their opening meet of the season Coach Schulte's tracksters defeated Minnesota, 68 to 36, winning eight of the twelve first places and tying for a ninth first place.

Heye Lambertus was the ace of the meet, winning first place in three of the events, the 60 yard HUSKER RIFLE CLUB dash, the 70 yard high and low hurdles. He set up new Minnesota field house records in the 60 yard dash and the 70 yard highs. His 6.2 second time in the dash tied the Big Ten indoor record.
