Wallace, secretary of agriculture, an alumnus of the college, will be presented with a fourteen inch "caricatured" medal which hung on the wall of the office of his father, Henry C. Wallace, when he was secretary of agriculture.

## GREEK GROUPS AT IOWA STATE LOWER HOUSE BILL PRICES

### Organizations Keep Pace With Reductions Made By Dormitories.

AMES, Ia., March 14.—Living expenses in fraternity and sorority houses at Iowa State College are this year 15 percent lower than they were a year ago.

Keeping pace with the reductions in room and board prices which campus dormitories and rooming houses have made recently to lighten the worries of student, the Greek letter organizations have cut corners in a dozen directions. The result is that fraternity "house bills" which include board, room and small monthly dues—have fallen from last year's \$47 average to \$38.80 a month, and sorority bills from \$47.50 to \$42. Some fraternity bills are as low as \$30 a month.

The reductions have been made by more careful food buying, lower rents and elimination of "extras." Greek-letter parties have been made simple and inexpensive this year, in contrast with more elaborate social events of previous years.

## Phi Delta Theta to Observe Fifty-Eighth Anniversary of Founding

Nebraska Alpha chapter of Phi Delta Theta, first fraternity on the Nebraska campus, will celebrate the fifty-eighth anniversary of its founding and its fiftieth year of continuous existence at a formal banquet Saturday night in the Cornhusker hotel. The greatest alumni attendance in the history of these annual events is expected.

Toastmaster for this year's affair will be H. A. Tukey, '01, former president of the Omaha board of education. Speakers for the banquet include E. A. Hardy, '93, Lincoln, and Gen. Amos Thomas, '09, of Omaha. Miles B. Houck, sr., '00, Omaha, is the alumnus in charge of arrangements for the banquet.

Phi Delta Theta was organized and chartered March 16, 1875, during the early years of the university. At that time the Nebraska campus consisted of only University hall, and an enrollment of about 100 students, many of them registered for high school courses. Lincoln was still a mid-western farm town, aspiring to rise to prominence as the state capital.

The early history of the chapter went unrecorded, with only two men's names appearing as charter members, these being Amos E. Gantt and Willis Sweet.

From this humble beginning the chapter has steadily grown, and at present has a chapter roll of over 500 alumni, who have scattered themselves over the world, and among whose names may be found many prominent men.

During its half century of existence, Nebraska Phi Deltas were active in campus activities. In the alumni lists may be found members of Phi Beta Kappa, Innocents, and other honorary organizations, as well as numerous former Husker athletes.

The chapter now maintains a house at 544 So. 17th st., the former residence of Judge Fields, and was at the time of its construction one of the most portentous dwellings in Lincoln. Mrs. Dora G. Finch has been the Phi Delta house mother for the past three years. Previous to that they

had no house mother. For the first time officers for both semesters in the fraternity have been headed by a Lincoln man. The president last semester was Russell J. Beers. This semester's president is James D. Henn. Other officers include Warren Smith, reported; Robert Pray, secretary; Robert Smith, Omaha, warden, and James Koubik, chaplain.

The long history of the chapter will be formally recognized at the annual province convention April 8, at Westminster college, Fulton, Mo. The representatives of colleges in Nebraska, Kansas, and Missouri will attend.
