

HUSKER SPRING GRID PLAYERS GO THROUGH INTENSIVE WORKOUTS

Coach Bible Bears Down on Candidates at Second Outdoor Drill.

Tuesday afternoon the Husker spring football candidates went thru a brisk workout in their second drill outdoors this spring. With two and a half weeks of drill remaining for the squad of about seventy which has been reporting, Coach Bible has been bearing down in the practices and looks forward to intensive work on the new plays which have been given the squad.

Pass plays predominate in the repertoire of formations presented by the coaching staff, and the various eleven have been clicking them off in fine fashion. With prospects pointing toward a speedy backfield which will carry plenty of weight also, the Husker attack probably will be varied considerably more than it has in the past. Power plays are being given more attention than they were with the comparatively light squad last fall.

A first eleven lining up in Tuesday's drill found at the ends Bruce Kilbourne and John Roby; Tackles, Gail O'Brien and Russell Thompson; guards, Warren DeBus and Clair Bishop; Glenn Jones at center; Jerry LaNoue, quarterback; halfbacks, Ralph Eldridge and George Sauer; with Jack Miller at fullback. Hub Boswell and Johnny Williams also worked in at backfield posts and Sears saw action at Roby's end job. Franklin Meier, center, and Lee Penney, end, failed to appear for drill, while Bernie Masterson, who played regular halfback of quarterback the last two years hasn't appeared for drill as yet.

A second team working on the plays was made up of Virgil Yeikin and Dave Fowler, ends; Forrest McPherson and John Kertakodes, tackles; Elmer Hubka and Neal Mehring, guards; Horchem, center; Ken White, quarterback; Bud Parsons and Mead, halfbacks, and Johnny Williams, fullback.

Coach Bible was highly pleased with the enthusiasm of the squad, and with the way they carried out the plays, which were given them in chalk talks last week, preceding the drills on the south field.

SCHULTE TO REFEREE MEET

Husker Track Mentor Will Officiate at Annual Kansas Relays.

Coach Henry F. Schulte, Nebraska's track mentor, has been selected to serve as referee at the Kansas Relays which are to be held at Lawrence on April 22. This is the eleventh annual relay carnival to be staged by the University of Kansas, and the usual large field is expected to compete for honors in this classic. Along with the Penn Relays, and the Drake Relays this event is one of the top notch track and field affairs of each season.

Governor Alf M. Landon of Kansas is to be the honorary referee, while John C. Grover of Kansas City is to be official starter for the tenth consecutive time.

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CONFERENCE CATCHES

Nebraska's famous track coach, Henry F. Schulte, has been chosen to serve as referee at the Kansas Relays this coming April 22, and this event being one of the leading relay carnivals of the year means that it is quite an honor to be selected for that job. In 1928 Schulte was one of the staff of five coaches which trained the United States team at Amsterdam. Knowing him to be as square-shooting a man as there is, all those acquainted with him feel that he deserves every honor he gets and more too. Any man who has the goods and appears as a candidate for the track team may feel sure that if he really has what it takes he'll be representing Nebraska. Partisanship isn't in "Indian" Schulte's vocabulary or make-up.

Prejudice and partisanship play sickening roles in athletics altho they usually aren't apparent to the casual observer. We hear about dear old Siwash's team going down to one defeat after another. "Well," we say, "guess there must not be good material on hand this year." The real trouble is, oftentimes, that it isn't Siwash's team in the first place, rather it is the coach's team with the favorites receiving the call instead of the best. Sometimes people don't realize how close home such conditions prevail. Sports may not be the most important thing on earth, but conditions can stand discussion, because people often ascribe importance to them.

Internal strife often causes a team to lose steadily when it should be on the winning road. For instance two or three players of the group may pick out a couple of men on whom they'll center evil designs, and consequently keep them off the team. Such a condition as this is just as apt as not to cause a really fine player on the same team to become so disgusted that he can't play good ball or hit the basket as he is able to, when playing with a representative, good-motived five. Having "pull" or "drag" means just as much on an athletic squad as it does any place else, but it is a blessing for Nebraska that it has a man such as Schulte to keep out prejudice on the track and field.

Francis Ayres, Nebraska's leading two mile man, is out of competition, probably for the rest of the season because of sinus trouble. That's a tough break for Coach Schulte's prospects, for Ayres has been developing into one of the best two milers in these parts, and last season was Big Six indoor champion at this distance. However, there are still Roy Blaser and Jim Story left in the fold to take care of this event. Story took third place in the conference indoor meet last week, and last spring Blaser won the two mile in the Big Six meet here.

SCHULTE SCHEDULES FOUR TRACK MEETS

Huskies Will Not See Action Until Kansas Relays April 22.

Nebraska's Track Schedule. Kansas Relays—April 22. Drake Relays—April 29. Minnesota (here)—May 11. Big Six meet (here)—May 25.

With four meets scheduled for this spring's outdoor track season, Coach Schulte's men do not see action again until April 22 when the select athletes from the Husker squad will try their mettle at the annual Kansas relay carnival at Lawrence.

The next week following the Jayhawker carnival comes the big classic of the midwest track season, the Drake relays, in which the finest athletes of the section compete. This competition is held annually at Des Moines, Ia., and is sponsored by Drake university.

Plan Dual Meet. On May 11 comes the only dual contest of the year, that with the Minnesota Gophers here in Memorial stadium. Late in February Nebraska tracksters downed the northern team, 63 to 36 on the Minneapolis indoor cinders. This will be the fifth athletic contest with the Minnesota teams engaged in by the Scarlet teams this year, further carrying out the extensive athletic program arranged between the two schools.

The Big Six meet is the main event of the year as far as the Schultes are concerned. Having tied for the title in the indoor mix last week, the Huskers will look forward to a possible championship here on May 25. Nebraska won the title last year in this meet which was also held here in Lincoln.

Husker hopes for points in the two mile took a tumble Tuesday when it was found that Francis Ayres probably will not be able to compete any more this season due to sinus and throat trouble. The ineligibility of Orin Dean, star pole-vaulter, was also another decided blow to Nebraska hopes.

PHI SIGS LEAD IN INTERFRAT MATCH

Group Totals 3,410 Points While Betas Follow With 3,390.

The Phi Sigma Kappas with a total of 3411 points, are leading the field in the interfraternity meet which is now in progress at the university stadium. However this is the total of only the first three events and the other participants are not far behind. 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Nebraska Women Will Not Fall for Mannish Fad, Says Dean Heppner

Nebraska women students will not go masculine was the opinion of Miss Amanda Heppner, dean of women, concerning the "trouser appareled women" fad which has swept the nation.

"I do not feel that Nebraska women will fall for the fad of wearing men's trousers and coats for street wear. I do feel, however, that such attire is entirely permissible for strictly sports wear," said Miss Heppner.

The popular fad of girls wearing men's clothing has taken many colleges and universities by storm, and met its first rebuff recently at the University of Oklahoma, where Miss E. McDaniels, dean of women, issued an order which forbade women students to appear on the campus in men's attire.

"It will not be necessary, in my opinion, to place any such order upon Nebraska women," continued Miss Heppner. "Those who originate these fads are usually from the Hollywood movie colony and do so merely for publicity."

Many women students at the university found the fad highly objectionable upon the ground that if a woman attires herself in men's clothing, femininity is lost sight of. One girl, when asked what she thought of the idea, said that "it was perfectly absurd;" another said it was "foolish." "I feel that such a practice makes one appear vane and egoistic," said a well known woman student.

SCHRAMM TO GIVE TALK

Professor Will Stress Need Of Purchasing American Made Merchandise.

"Economic Development of Natural Resources," is the subject of the talk to be given by Prof. E. F. Schramm of the Geology department at the A. S. C. E. meeting to be held in Morrill Hall Room 9 Wednesday, March 15. A. S. C. E., which is open to Civil Engineering students, is the local organization of the American Society of Chemical Engineers.

Schramm, who will stress the idea of "Buy American Made Merchandise," declared, "We have great natural resources, but they are undeveloped. Most of what we produce is consumed in this country, but we have too large an importation of products which could be produced with the expenditure of some labor." His discussion will be based on this general theme.
