As the university teachers college offers graduate work to 800 who are in executive posts, and the four normal schools are permitted to give only a bachelor's degree in education only, Miss Muir of Lancaster stated that an attempt to duplicate this work in four normals, would plunge the state into unnecessary expense. The per capita costs at the Kearney normal, she said, is reported to be \$184 while it is but \$30 at the university teachers' college.
