Coliseum Decorations Contract Let

YEARBOOK HAS MOST VOTES IN PROPOSED ACTIVITY TAX PLAN

Athletic Ticket and Daily Nebraskan Tie for Second Place.

Results of the senior vote on the activities tax, tabulated Monday by Student council officials, shows the Cornhusker leading in the race for items to be included in the plan with 199 out of the 210 affirmative votes given the plan at the spring election last Thursday.

The Daily Nebraskan and athletic ticket were tied for a close second with 197 votes each. Sixty people approved all the items listed. The total senior vote gove 210 in favor of the principle of plan and 78 against the plan in any form.

Unlisted items received scattered votes as follows: Blue Print 3; Cornhusker-Countryman, 2; University Players, 4; Kosmet Klub 1. The senior vote, taken by the council more as a sample of student opinion than as a binding basis for it sown recommendations to the Board of Regents, will be supplemented by a vote of all undergraduates when they register next week.


