Dean Lyman Gives Welcome.

An address of welcome was given by Dean R. A. Lyman to freshmen in the college of pharmacy at a morning convocation at Pharmacy Hall. Faculty members were introduced and brief talks were made by Prof. J. E. Burt, Assistant Prof. C. L. Wilde, Assistant Prof. F. S. Buskey and Instructor Lillian M. Langewin. Meetings with advisers were held in the afternoon.

New students in the teachers college listened to an address of welcome by Dean F. E. Henzlik, a talk on "The Freshman and the Teachers College" by Dr. Stephen M. Corey, and music by the girls chorus. Dr. H. C. Koch presided. Talks with advisers and registration of students continued during the afternoon.

The annual convocation in Grant Memorial Hall was instituted by the university to enable the new students to complete their registration more rapidly, as well as to orient them with their surroundings before actual classroom instruction commenced.

The full text of the chancellor's speech before the freshmen assembled in the Memorial hall Monday morning is as follows:

To the Freshman Class:

We are glad to see this goodly company of young men and women entering the university. We welcome you wholeheartedly to all the privileges and opportunities of university life. The family are here to help you in every way possible, both in scholarship and as personal advisers.

Many things here will be strange to you. You are largely separated from home influences and direction. This places greater responsibilities upon you and greater need for self-direction.

The university has provided Freshman day to acquaint you with the procedure of registering in one of the several colleges so that your work may be properly laid out and your personal problems may receive better attention.

When your registration is completed you may still find that your program is not properly adjusted to your needs. We have provided an adviser for each student who will give your problem his or her special attention. We have also provided in each college some person who will help you to correct difficulties in scholarship as help you make personal adjustments.

See the dean of your college at once or any member of the faculty whom you have met. They will see that you get in touch with the right persons to adjust your troubles.

We want you as students to feel that the faculty and every officer of the university is interested in your welfare and in your success. The offices of the dean of student affairs, the dean of women, the registrar, and the chancellor are always open to you for such assistance as they may be able to render.

The university is a great storehouse of knowledge with extensive libraries, museums and laboratories filled with information. It has a
