## NEBRASKA SQUAD WORKS OUTDOORS

**Coach Bible Announces Scrimmage to Be Held Saturday On South Practice Field; 2 O'clock Time Set For Scraps Among Four Elevens.**

**UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS TO BE FIRST HUSKER FOE**  
**Henry Bauer, Ralph Eldridge, Burt Durkee, Ken White Will Not Be Playing This Year; Husker Coach Has Many Problems Yet to Be Solved.**

Having advantageously utilized the periods spent indoors on chalk talks, formations and track meets, held under the memorial stadium, the Husker squad went to work in earnest with the arrival of favorable weather, according to Coach Bible. A number of plays, totaling around 15, have been given to the players to learn. The chalk talks included running plays, passing attacks, and defenses in addition to two formations, one on punting and a double wing back. Defense work on punting formations was also highly stressed.

### Practice Punt.

Following the limbering up exercises group workouts were held in which the squad was divided into separate departments with the coaching staff supervising. Most of the time was spent in helping the punters who were mainly comprised of George Sauer, Virgil Yelkin, John Roby and Glen Skewes.

Dick Smith was included in this array but he is now on the casualty list, presenting the first one of the season. Dick, second string center, threw his knee out of joint during blocking practice. Smith formerly had trouble with the

same knee while playing football at Lincoln High.

Coach Bible intends to form a "B" team Monday and is very anxious to have interested men report for suits. He expects quite a good sized turnout.

### Scrimmage Saturday.

This Saturday a scrimmage is going to be held at 2 o'clock on the practice field of the stadium. The varsity squad will be divided into four teams, as the freshman team is not completely organized, with teams one and two composed of tentative varsity material. Teams two and three will be made up of future "B" prospects likely. However, teams one and two are not going to play each other, instead squads one and two are going to meet squads three and four, respectively.

It is now known that Burt Durkee will not be back for this season. He is living in Rock Island, Ill. at the present time but intends to be back next year. Henry "Chief" Bauer is now in school but will not be eligible because of scholastic problems. Kenneth White and Ralph Eldridge are both working this year also, intending to return in 1934.

### Nebraska Has Handicap.

Nebraska will be considered handicapped in the first two conflicts of the season as both Texas and Iowa State will have participated in two games before meeting the Huskers. Texas plays Southwestern University and the El Paso School of Mines first, thus giving them valuable experience. Iowa State, before playing the Biblemen, will have been thru two conflicts with a week lay-off afterwards. This enables them to have two weeks in which to scout Nebraska and prepare for their special type of plays.

The temporary lineup for the Nebraska varsity is composed entirely of veterans with George Sauer playing fullback Hubert Boswell and Jack Miller, half-backs; Bernard Blasterson, quarterback; Bruce Kilbourne and Lee Penny, ends; Pflum and Gail O'Brien, tackles; Warren DeBus and Clair Bishop, guards; and Franklin Meier covering center.

## DRILL APPLICANTS NOT STOPPED BY PAY SLASH

Additional Posts Granted by Corps Area Officers Promptly Filled.

The number of applicants for officer's commissions in the advanced drill course far exceed the number of positions to be filled, according to Col. W. H. Oury, R. O. T. C. commandant. There has also been an increase of seventeen in the number of officers the Seventh corps area has made available for the Nebraska regiment.

Salaries of the student officers have been cut for this year, and the training camp for student officers was cut from six to four weeks' time because of the reduction in government expenditures for military training. In spite of the reduction in salary a greater number registered for the advanced course than in past years.

The Nebraska company won the competitive drills at the training camp at Fort Crook this summer. A company composed of half Nebraska and half South Dakota men won the athletic and swimming meet and the honor of best student officer went to Richard Nicholson from Nebraska.

The cadet officers will be appointed by the staff of the military department as soon as possible so the program of the year may begin. Both the commissioned and the non-commissioned officers will be appointed at the same time. The first work of the year will be the preparation for the Armistice day parade.

"The prospects for the year are very good," is the opinion of Colonel Oury, "and we are very fortunate to have the same staff of instructors this year that we had last."

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## LARGE FIRST YEAR SQUAD WORKING OUT

About 50 Freshmen Report To Coach Weir for First Practice Session.

### EXPECT A FINE ELEVEN

With a roster of half a hundred freshmen reporting for equipment Coach Ed Weir is rather optimistic about the Freshman-Varsity battle scheduled for Sept. 30. He believes that the Fresh will give the varsity plenty of fight in spite of the fact that the first string will most likely be composed of all veterans.

"Although the varsity is nearer ready to go this fall than in many seasons, I think we'll give them a good argument," Weir stated. The freshmen who have appeared so far this season appear much older and rangier than has been the case for several seasons Weir believes.

Lloyd Cardwell, ace track and football performer from Seward, will attend school this year which should help to brighten the Freshmen's hopes. Another athlete of high school fame is Sam Francis, from Oberlin, Kas., who has decided to come here to attend school. Francis won the national high school shot put crown last June in Chicago when he tossed the twelve pound ball 53 feet 7 1/2 inches. He's a rangy chap, built along the lines of George Sauer, and is an exceptionally hard runner.

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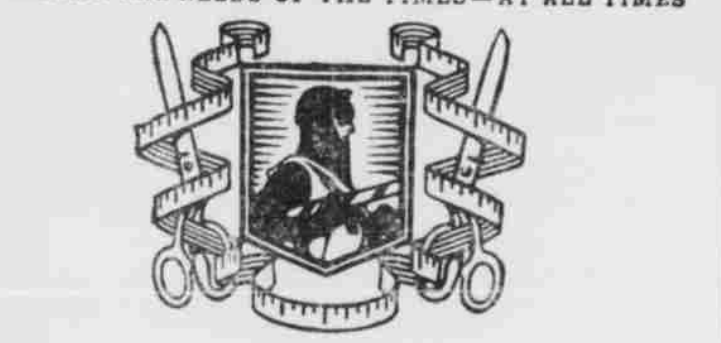
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
