PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 11 (C.N.S.). An increase in the number of opportunities for employment offered by the University of Pennsylvania Alumni Placement Service to graduates of the university has been noted for the first time in four years. Dr. Clarence E. Clewell, director of the service, announced this week. During the first two weeks of September, he said, three times as many calls for graduates were received than during the same period last year.

PALO ALTO, Oct. 11 (C.N.S.). Stanford University this week mourned the death of Professor Everett Wallace Smith, head of the department of journalism for many years and first editor of the student newspaper at the university. He died unexpectedly after a sudden attack of pneumonia. He was 58 years old.

(Continued from Page 1.) The request of alumni of various chapters on the university campus, and the subsequent appointment of a temporary committee to call for delegates to a permanent organization.

2. The election of official delegates from every undergraduate chapter on the university campus.

3. The selection of the executive committee to call a meeting of the delegates and set the organization into operation.

Not Official University Group. Although the work of organization has so far been under the supervision of Dean Thompson, the supervision of the new official council is to have no official connection with the university.

Members of the executive committee predict an early completion of the formation of the council and have been encouraged by the interest taken by the undergraduate chapters. John Curtis, Delta Chi, has been elected president, and Claude Wilson, Alpha Tau Omega, secretary of the alumni council executive committee.

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
