

BROWNE ISSUES FIRST CALL FOR CAGE ASPIRANTS

Varsity and Frosh Hoopsters To Inaugurate Practice Sessions Monday.

SCHEDULE 17 CONTESTS

Six of Eight Veterans Not Available Till Close of Grid Season.

Coach W. H. Browne's basketball team will formally inaugurate the 1933-34 basketball season Monday, Nov. 13, when all freshman and varsity hoopsters get out for football, will hold their first regular practice session. The men from last year who will report for practice Monday include Kenneth Lunney, Grand Island, and Paul Mason, Omaha, forwards, and Belka, guard. Veterans who will not be available until after the close of the football season are George Sauer, guard; Hubert Boswell, forward; Bud Parsons, forward and Leland Copple, center.

Promising candidates coming up from last year's freshman outfit include Loder, Morris, Keller, Zentz and Lenzen, forwards; centers, Sorenson, Scott, Eno, Wideman, guards, Yelkin, Durfee, Scherer, North, Berry and Bulac. Yelkin and Scherer will not be available until the close of the football season.

Form Frosh League.

In order to round the Freshmen into shape earlier than usual and to give them enough experience in playing together to furnish the varsity good competition, a league has been formed composed of six teams. One team will represent the Agriculture college campus and the remaining squads will be taken from the city campus. A double round robin will be staged between the teams and the winning team will be awarded prizes at the end of the season.

Give Credit.

Those reporting to practice immediately will be given credit scholastically for the time spent on the maples. Furthermore all freshmen participating will be granted free passes to the Varsity games and those who continue to show up well will receive numerals at the end of the season. A complete record of the performances of each individual player will be kept throughout the season, as is done in tournaments, and the numeral awards will be based on these showings.

The freshmen league will be under the direction of Harold Petz, intramural athletic director, but Morris Fisher, former star on the Husker basketball quintet, will assist in the instruction. Steve Holak, manager on last year's squad, and Mutt Voltz will also render part time assistance, Coach Browne stated.

Temperamental Westerner.

The capable performance of Mae Posey in the players' first production of the season won for her the coveted role which Jean Harlow plays on the screen. As the temperamental wife of a wealthy westerner, Miss Posey is assuming one of the most important characterizations in the play.

Dorothy Zimmer likewise steps into a major part, when she plays the role in which Marie Dressler is seen on the screen. By virtue of her excellent performance as Mrs. Haggett in "The Late Christopher Bean" as well as her previous performances, Miss Zimmer is expected to give a vivid portrayal.

Gilbert Portrays Doctor.

Louren Gilbert, graduate of the University of Michigan, who made his first appearance with the players in "The Late Christopher Bean," has been selected for the important role of Dr. J. Wayne Talbot. This part is carried by Edmund Lowe in the cinema version.

For the other members of this extraordinary cast the players have selected students in the department who have shown exceptional ability and who are fitted for the particular role. Many of them have been seen in previous productions by the players.

Playing in Chicago.

The play was written by George S. Kaufman, who is the nation's most successful playwright, and Edna Ferber, well known novelist and dramatist. It was originally produced by Sam H. Harris and played in the Music Box theater in New York City and on the road for one year. It is still playing in Chicago.

A screen version of the play has been made, which includes one of the most prodigious casts ever assembled for a cinema.

Is Unusual Situation.

The presentation of the play in Lincoln so soon after its New York run is an unusual situation, and with the exception of "Christopher Bean" is practically without precedent in the history of the players. The tremendous success of "Christopher Bean," the first production of the players' season, and the promising prospects of "Dinner at Eight" are making this an outstanding season for the players.

Contains Three Acts.

The play includes three acts and eleven scenes, the staging of which presents one of the largest tasks attempted by the players. Characterizations are the keynote of the drama, which is of a type similar to "Grand Hotel" in its construction, but considerably different in its setting and subject matter.

The lives of the several guests at a dinner party are revealed during the course of the play, which attains its dramatic pitch from the struggle of these individuals for wealth, love, fame and pleasure.

HUSKERS CAN NAB BIG SIX TITLE THIS WEEK

Nebraska Victory Saturday Will Give Team Fifth Championship.

BIBLEMEN SURE OF TIE

A victory for the Nebraska football team this week-end when it meets Kansas on Homecoming day, Nov. 11, would result in the Huskers again capturing the Big Six conference title which the Biblemen have managed to win four out of the five years the conference has been in existence. Coach Bibbe's pupils are already assured of a tie for the title.

With the number of grads returning to see the Homecoming tilt reaching well into the thousand mark, a large crowd is expected to view the fortieth battle between the Jayhawkers and the Huskers. Additional factors due to attract an especially large crowd are the facts that Kansas tied the strong Notre Dame Ramblers and that the Armistice holiday will make it possible for many to see the game. Kansas fans totaling around a thousand are expected to make the trip to Memorial stadium where a whole section has been reserved for the Jayhawkers. Pershing Rifles, national honorary fraternity of the military department, will fire a salute for the occasion.

Kansas Line Stout.

The ability of the Kansas line is not held in doubt as the Jayhawkers proved in their tilt with the Notre Dame Ramblers. However, there has been some skepticism as to their scoring punch. Hall, 100 yard sprint champion in Big Six circles, will provide the speed of the attack. Rex Beach, weighing 206 pounds, is scheduled to exhibit the power of the offense. However, the main threat is Peterson, an elusive and clever broken field runner.

Kansas State in playing Iowa State at Ames, is expected to have little trouble in emerging victorious over the Cyclones. After their tough battle with Michigan State, which resulted in a 0 to 0 tie, the Kansas Aggie Wildcatters might be due for a letdown but even this is not expected to allow them to finish on the small end of the scoring.

Oklahoma Favorite.

Oklahoma, meeting the Missouri Tigers at Columbia, has been heavily favored to run over the unfortunate Tigers. Missouri, who has been having a dismal season of it, is not strong enough to withstand the strong barrage which the Sooners are preparing for them. The Sooners victory over

Kansas has tremendously increased the Oklahoma status.
