The Scarlet and Cream mermen will make a bid for tank supremacy over the strong Iowa State team headed by Murphy who has shattered conference times in the 50, 100, and 220 yard free styles. Despite the fact that the Iowans are favorites, Nebraska, with Bernie Masterson and Glyndon Lynde in good shape is given an outside chance for the championship.

This meet will mark the close in the final chapter of collegiate swimming for Dan Easterday, Bernie Masterson, and Howard Church, whose combined efforts for the last three years have boosted Nebraska to a top rated team of the Big Six.

Dan Easterday, Varsity 220 yard free style mermen, started his college splash career when he established himself on the Freshman team in his first semester. After dropping the Scarlet and Cream Dan captured fourth position in the Big Six meet and bettered his mark last year by being the second to touch the edge of the pool in the 220 and 440 yard free style events. He is rated as a top notcher by most conference mentors.

Howard Church, Varsity backstroke and distance artist for three years, will also take to the water for the last official time next Saturday. Howard has been rated as the second best backstroke artist in the conference throughout his era of intercollegiate competition. Illness prevented his victories in the earlier meets of the season, but now in the pink of condition he will show his wares in the final go.

Bernie Masterson, Nebraska's popular tank man in almost all swimming circles of distinction in the middle west, will answer the gun for the last time. Bernie has been performing excellently all season and besides being on the record holding Big Six relay team and champion of the 50 yard free style, he succeeded in hanging up new pool records in the 50 and 100 yard free styles in the last meet with Grinnell College. Bernie has been asked to fill the position which will be left by Ken Sutherland through graduation.

**BIBLE PUTS GRID CANDIDATES THRU SIGNAL PRACTICE**

**Last Year Men Predominate On Eleven Working Out Thursday.**

**TURNOUT PLEASES COACH Chase, Cardwell, and Howell Of Freshmen Impress in First Drill.**

Advance notice of what the Husker football machine may look like next fall was given in spring practice Thursday afternoon as Coach Bible lined up eleven gridgers in their positions and sent them thru the first signal practice. The team was composed almost entirely of last year's men.

The squad was divided up into three groups for the practice session, with Coach "Indian" Schulte once more teaching the linemen the tricks of going thru and how to prevent an opponent from doing the same. It was Schulte's first appearance at the spring practice, as the veteran line coach has been occupied with track work.

A large portion of the time was spent in passing and punting, with Coach Bible taking care of the varsity men from last year's team, and George Sauer coaching the freshmen leather luggers, Johnny Howell and Lloyd Cardwell of the freshmen particularly impressed the coaches with their punting ability, and Howell was flipping passes with considerable accuracy.

**Linemen Scrimmage.** Schulte and Wehr had the linemen paired up and doing actual scrimmage work against each other. The guards were given particular attention, with Heldt and Mehring showing up well in the art of blocking and opening up holes.

First scrimmage of the year will probably take place this afternoon between two varsity teams. Several plays have been given the men for study, and Coach Bible has decided to see how the men can carry out their jobs under fire. The first practice game of the spring season will be held a week from Saturday, and considerable scrimmaging will have to be done to familiarize the players, especially the frosh, with the plays.

In order to aid the candidates for positions in learning the plays, Coach Bible had last year's veterans running signals up and down the field, centering on the work of each man in regard to the whole team functions. A freshman team acted as a dummy group for the veterans to work against.

Several of the frosh line hopefuls showed up well in practice. Chase, former Wymore gridger, impressed Coach Schulte with his ability to use his 200 pounds of bulk in blocking out opponents.

One hundred and four suits had been checked out of the equipment room by Wednesday afternoon, making the present squad the largest ever to turn out for spring practice. Head Coach Bible regarded the turnout with anything but sorrow. "We are more than pleased with the number of men reporting," said the Nebraska mentor, "especially since the spring sessions will have much to do with determining the team next fall, and, not only the membership of the team, but the quality of the team."
