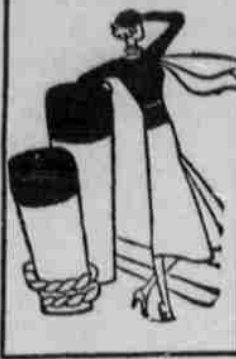


CAMPUSOCIETY
