



According to Chancellor Burnett one of the chief problems which has confronted the university board of regents during the past four or five years is the retire-ment pension for faculty members who retire at the age of 70 after serving twenty-five years. In connection with the retirement system, which has already been installed, Chancellor Burnett said the regents were considering a plan of annuity insurance by which the faculty would pay into a fund established for the purpose, 5 percent of their annual salary for twenty-five years. This idea is only being discussed, however, he emphasized, Other problems which have con-
