

24 FRATERNITIES TO COMPETE FOR MAPLES HONORS

Program Opens With Games In Coliseum Tuesday Evening.

Class A quintets from two dozen fraternities will launch the largest Greek cage program ever undertaken at Huskerland, tonight at 7 in the coliseum. After nearly desurfacing the coliseum hardwoods in the preseason workouts of vacation, all the aggregations, many of which have lineups identical to those of last season, report that they are well primed for the promised action of the new basketball festivities.

The program, which was planned to start at the ill fated game time, swings into action some three weeks late, yet enthusiasm for the sport has swelled during the delay. At this time a year ago the intramural cage ledgers were collecting dust in the files and the Phi Kappa Psi fraternity was the proud possessor of the victors' plaque. Familiar faces will feature the Phi Psi team of this season, thus throwing them directly in the path of anyone who has serious intentions toward the maple championship.

Other finalists of 1935 were Sigma Nu, Delta Tau Delta, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, and Alpha Gamma Rho, all of whom are packed with veterans. Another serious contender for the title is Pi Kappa Alpha, a three year class B crown bearer. Their obvious intentions are to slip into the upper bracket and stealthily snatch the trophy while other affiliations are concerning themselves with more renowned teams.

All entrants will be bound by blanket rules. Predominating among these are that no man playing varsity, B team, or freshman basketball will be allowed to participate. Any man may move at any time from the A squad of his fraternity to the B, but once he does he must remain on this team. No games will be postponed unless previous and mutual arrangements are made between the intramural office and both fraternities.

Leagues Arranged.

Leagues have been drawn up by the Greek office dignitaries and games will be scheduled accordingly. Each quintet must meet every other member of its league. At the completion of the round robin, the clan riding on the apex according to percentages will enter a round robin with the victors of the other four leagues.

HUSKER MAT MEN UPSET TIGERS TO TAKE 11-17 WIN

Funken Rallies in Last Bout To Cinch Victory for Nebraskans.

Nebraska's wrestling team, under the tutelage of Coach Jerry Adams, took the long end of a 17 to 11 decision over the University of Missouri in a dual meet at the coliseum Friday night.

Missouri led through the contest, until Loren Mims applied a leg lock on Marburg Lundstrom in the 175 pound class and won the fall in 4 minutes and 20 seconds. This Cornhusker win put Nebraska ahead 14 to 11 with one more event to take place.

Bernard Funken rallied in the closing seconds of the finale to win the decision over Johnny Ferguson, Tiger heavyweight. Other Husker wins were turned in by Sol Levine, who substituted for Don Sladnick and won the fall from Sid Rainen in the 165 pound class, and by Cleo Smiley who defeated Nelson Haley in the 126 pound division.

Two bouts resulted in draws, Husker Capt. Ray Larson drawing with Lloyd Grieb and Julius Wittman drawing with Harold Starr, Tiger captain. Missouri scored two complete

HUSKER BASKETEERS TAKE 43-30 VICTORY OVER KANSAS AGGIES

Second Place Position in Big Six Tightened; Game Attracts 4000.

Nebraska strengthened its grip on second place in the Big Six conference race by outplaying Kansas State 43 to 30 in a mediocre game at the coliseum Saturday night.

Over 4,000 basketball patrons braved the wintry blasts to witness Coach Browne's fast breaking Huskers stage an offensive game that proved too much for the Wildcats. Nebraska's victory firmly entrenched the Huskers in second place with three wins and two defeats and sent Kansas State to the cellar position with only one victory out of four tilts.

The Damon and Pythias combination had nothing over the Henry Whitaker and George Wahlquist teamwork that was so evident through the game. Wahlquist won the scoring honors Saturday evening by registering twelve points. Bob Parsons emerged runnerup with eleven points and Henry Whitaker rang the bell for nine points.

The appointment of Henry F. Schulte, university track and field coach, as state chairman for the finance drive for the 1936 Olympic games was made known yesterday by George F. Veenker, of Iowa State college who is district chairman for the National Collegiate Athletic association Olympic finance committee.

The committee organized for solicitation of funds for the 1936 Olympic games to be held in Berlin and divided the United States into eight districts, the fifth of which the Iowa State college athletic director is in charge.
