### SCHERER MAINTAINS NEBRASKA'S SUPPLY GROUND WATER GOOD

(Continued from Page 1.) larly as far as municipal wells and irrigation projects are concerned. Furness, Red Willow, Hitchcock, Keya Paha, Boyd, the northern part of Holt, Cass, Otoe, Nemaha, Pawnee, Johnson, Richardson, and a large part of Gage. These counties are most severely affected because the bedrock, or base of their water storage reservoir is too near the surface of the ground.

Cherry county holds the largest supply of underground water, Scherer said. He estimates there are 445,574,000 acre feet to be found there now, with Sheridan county ranking second with 165,966,000 acre feet and Grant third with 147,170,000 acre feet.

### Condra Conducted Course.

Dean Condra, who is in charge of the well drillers short course, answered questions regarding water bearing formations in the state, while Prof. C. J. Frankforter of the department of chemistry, discussed the chemical composition of the state's groundwaters. Professor Frankforter illustrated his address with samples of the various types of water and demonstrated how water tests are made. There were about 100 in attendance at the Friday sessions. ### Church Plans Discussions On Philosophy, Music, Manners, Morals.

With three new commission topics, the student group of Westminster Presbyterian church will initiate their spring youth fellowship program this evening at 5:30 o'clock. The subjects undertaken for discussion will be philosophies of life, music in worship, and manners and morals.

Dr. H. O. Hertzler, of the university sociology department, will lead the commission on "Building a Philosophy of Life" with special portent to its social outlook. "Appreciation of Music in Worship" will be conducted by Minister of Music Donald Ketting. Miss Lucille Harris, a teacher in the Lincoln public schools, will be in charge of the commission group dealing with "The Right Thing in Manners and Morals."
