MILTON PREDICTS RICH FUTURE FOR AMERICAN YOUTH

(Continued from Page 1.) Defending the government for its entrance into business and the departure of the 'laissez faire' age.

Mr. Milton, taking a hasty inventory of the shape and pattern of America's economic situation, dwelt upon the economic situation of the United States, its raw materials, labor, management, capital power and the government's relationship to industry.

"Our essential political philosophy remains that of a private property democracy. The people of this nation believe in individual ownership and in the owner's responsibility for the proper employment of his property, as well as his right to enjoy it.

"They do not want to change apple pie for spinach, they merely ask a little larger slice of the same sort of apple pie that mother used to make," he said.

"The speaker, whose activities in academic and literary circles have won him national fame, predicted that capitalism can be made a success here, but in its present manifestations, it needs a thorough reform, its methods, techniques and practices need streamlining.

"That wise man, Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, said that 'change is the law of life,' and our capitalistic patterns have lagged in their adjustment to this law of change, from which no institution are exempt. It is folly to seek half imperative changes; the task of statesmanship, the role of social intelligence is to seek to cushion its shocks."

Agriculture, the nations' basic industry, is depressed and dispossessed, according to Editor Milton. "A long time national policy—the tariff—has disadvantaged it at the expense of industry and commerce.

sidtdown takes property by private force for private purposes. It is illegal, morally reprehensible and revolutionary in its implications, and must will be brought to an end, as must the use of private violence in strikes by either side.

"What is clearly ahead is the guarantee, through government, of collective bargaining, and then the enforcement, through government, of the bargain made on bargainers. In the last few weeks, a national labor policy has begun to crystallize along these lines.

"Some still talk of the law of supply and demand as though it were as immutable as a mathematical principle as that which Isaac Newton discovered when an apple fell on his head," he said.
