Tassels.

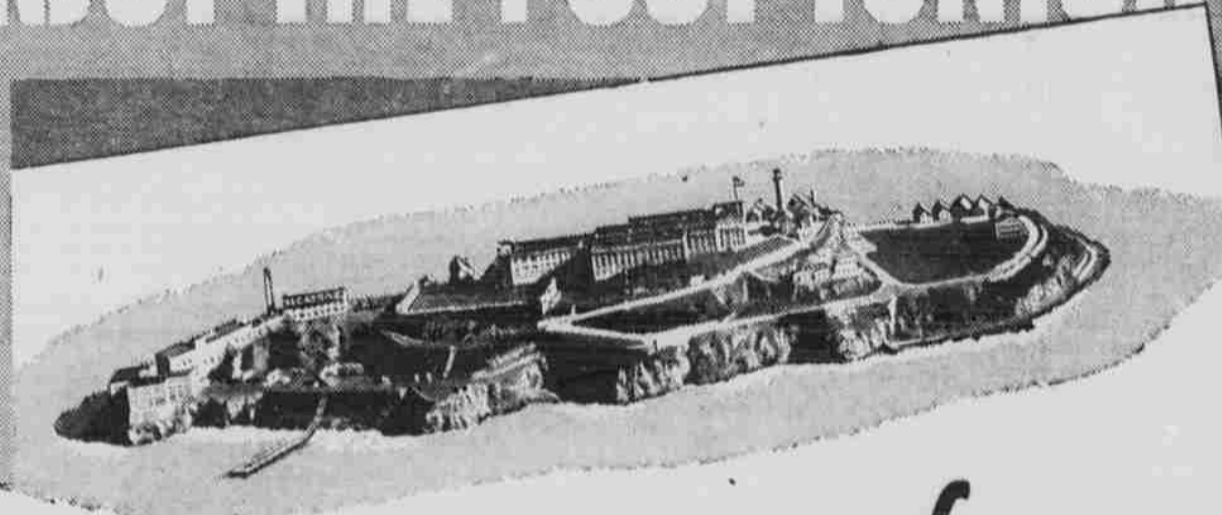
Regular meeting of Tassels will be held tonight at 7 in Social Science 105.
