Educators Inc.--

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A thoro study of the contract which those students who accept positions with the Association must sign, features the following points: The 'dealers' or solicitor is to receive 30 percent on all sales; eight hour days during the summer; he is guaranteed \$180 for his summers work. He must send reports of each days work into the office as a weekly report before the Monday of the following week; he must take a training course sponsored by the Association before he can sell the book; and he must make a \$5.75 deposit on his sales equipment.

Key Clause.

above terms the first party (the binding, association) is freed from any obligations to make any payment whatsoever to the dealer other than profits on sales actually made.

In other words, the infraction of any of the above stipulated duties and many smaller points presented in the contract gives the association the power to declare the entire contract void. Any person working as a solicitor must be entirely thoro and accurate in his duties, or the association can legally refuse to carry out their part of the contract on grounds that the solicitor violated agreements.


