

### Witte leaves to take job in Washington

### **Director of graduate** school of social work to stay till September

Dr. Ernest F. Witte, director of the graduate school of social work since its founding in September of 1937, has tendered his resignation, effective September 1, to accept a similar position at the University of Washington.

Dr. Witte accepted the Washington position as the better of two unsolicited offers he received this spring.

Dr. Witte expressed his regret at leaving Nebraska, but added, "I am happy to go to Washing-ton because it is a state which for many years has had a well de-veloped public welfare program (See WITTE page 2.)

Leon Thomson, Nebraska peace council secretary and Dr. R. A. Winnacker of the history department will discuss alternate ways to peace at the Student Council's last forum of the year to be held this Wednesday at 11 o'clock in parlors Y and Z of the Union. "Nations do not have the materials they need, and I will discuss two solutions to the problem, stated Mr. Thomson. "First is the opening of the channels of trade and second is the coming to grips with the problem of empire. Winnacker to compare solutions. Dr. Winnacker will discuss "ways to peace that are open in the present critical situation in an illogical world." He will compare "the isolationist position to the Roosevelt policy for peace. "Roosevelt proposes to throw American weight to the 'socalled' democracies of Europe." Each speaker will talk from 15 to 20 minutes with Mr. Thomson taking the floor first. At the close of the speeches the floor will be thrown open to general discus-sion. The forum is open free of charge to all students. Arrangements are being handled for the Council by Emma Marie Schuttlof-fel and Bob Waugh of the forum committee.

## **Progressives** win **Council majority**

Liberals gain only 5 of 13 posts on governing body but 2 of 3 publications board positions; Barb preference vote assures 2 Councilors

In one of the largest votes ever cast on the University of Nebraska campus, the Progressive party after five consecutive years of strong council supremacy, sacrificed five of the prec-

ious thirteen seats to Liberal men.

The new Council members will hold their first meeting and election of officers this afternoon at 5 o'clock in room 315 of the Union.

Casting a 23 vote majority party preference ticket at the election and up to hundred vote majorities on the senior menat-large, and business administration ballots, Progressives eased into power eight men by relatively slight margins. Two additional seats went to the Barb Unionist candidates by virtue of the Council constitutional ruling that each party must be given a seat for every 125 votes cast.

### **Big turnout**.

More than one-third of the enrolled students of the school (2,254) came to the polls at the Student Union and Ag hall yester-day to fill 36 Student Council. Barb and ag campus posts. This figure was exceeded but once in a fall presidential election, years ago, when seven exceptionally popular campus leaders drew a combined vote slightly exceeding 3,900.

Current postings of results were compiled at the DAILY NEBRAS-KAN office as the various student council ballot counters reported results to E. W. Lantz, Student Council sponsor and faculty supervisor of the election.

A strong progressive vote in the early morning sent early figures in a decidedly progressive trend, giving seven seats to the present party of power, four seats to the Liberal opposition and one graduate position to the Barb Union faction. Ag campus failed to report standings until the final count was finished.

John Mason and Jim Minnick, Liberal arts and science men, secured a marked lead at the start, maintaining and increasing it as the balloting proceeded. The senior men at large fought a neck to neck battle, the Progressives. Adna Dobson and Bob Flory, only certain of their posts after the last ballots had been counted.

With voters forming lines almost as soon as the polls opened about 8:30 in the morning, the spring election day spirit blossomed in full glory as competing factions in all makes and grades of automobiles went up and down sorority row collecting voters. Party leaders and interested politicians met regularly at the NEBRAS-KAN awaiting the first preliminary returns, posted as the booths closed at 5 o'clock.

A last minute liberal flurry in the graduate college gave Heady a 14 vote tally, pushing him ahead of the Barb candidate and changing the party standings to 7 Progressives, 5 Laberals and no Barbs. Anna Mary Reed, written in as the woman candidate, became the coed graduate representative on the council.

Polling the highest vote of the day, at 1.378, Priscilla Wicks captured the position of senior woman-at large as did Virginia Wheeler, close second with 1,325.

Late returns from ag campus favored the barb senior candidates over those representing the contesting factions. This raised the number of hallots going to Ells-worth Steele and Otto Woerner, and placed them on the council. Marvin Kruse defeated Leo Cooksley for the male ag position and Ruth Ann Sheldon wan the women's candidacy by a 60 point margin.

Close competition.

With close competition for the third arts and science woman post, Tess Casady secured a seat by a four vote plurality over the 230 (See OFFICES page 2.)
