Bus Knight and Harry Hopp, two other juniors, have been alternating with Petsch and Rohrig respectively in the backfield. All ten are first rate performers, and it is around that junior group which Biff has been building. Bob Kahler, the other junior, saw service against Indiana, but the other men have been in a good share of the time in each of the first three games. .

War Horse George Seemann is the only senior who has started all three games, although Bob Ramey was in at the kickoff of the first two. Sam Schwartzkopf and Jack Ashburn started last Saturday. Adna Dobson was in a while as fullback against Minnesota, and Theos Thompson took over quar-terback duties during part of the second half at Ames.

Now to the sophomores, who have thus far come through in good style. Guard and fullback posts probably possess the best sophomores, with Eddie Schwartzkopf, Hub Monsky and George Abel at guards, and Vike Francis and Henry Rohn at fullback. Big Monsky, who intercepted that last Indiana pass, Abel, who looks like one of the best running guards who has ever hit Nebraska, and little Schwartzkopf, should insure the Huskers fine guards for the next few seasons barring unforeseen injuries, incidents, etc. Rohn is a fine ball carrier, and Francis, a defensive bearcat, is blossoming as a plunger and punter. Monsky started the first two games, Schwartzkopf the next, and Francis has been in the starting lineup since the season began.

Fourteen lettermen are numbered on the Baylor Bear squad which will play here Saturday, and while most of the men in the starting lineup are veterans, the Bruin sophomores were the best freshmen the Waco school ever had.

Last year the Baylor team was led by Billy Patterson, whom Biff Jones called one of the country's greatest players. Patterson was a bulls-eye passer, and the Bruins played a wide-open game last fall.

However, this year, behind the rushes of 200 pound Jackie Wilson, sophomore sensation, and let-terman Jimmy Witt, the Bears switched to a power game which beat Arizona, Witt and Wilson scored against the Razorbacks. If the reich does not pay up its debts Jugoslavia may even cancel contracts with her. The senate foreign relations committee now proposes to permit American ships to carry goods to belligerent possessions in the South Atlantic and Pacific. Arms, ammunition and implements of war would be barred, however. ting up a war economy here.
