Economist, candidate . . .

Claims he has panacea for world's ills in 'simple' plan

R. S. Hunt, who claims he has the panacea for the ills of the world, yesterday presented his plan in Professor Arndt's ten o'clock Economics 203 class. His theory is to make the money yield from production adequate to buy back production for consumption for cash. According to Mr. Hunt, this plan will end all unemployment and excessive tax burdens and it can increase the national wealth from 67½ billion to 100 billion, or 125 billion or 150 billion at will.

He also claims that this program will preserve private initiative, guarantee private reward commensurate with quality and quantity of effort, private ownership and use of property which combined constitute the essence of human liberty and freedom.

A candidate.

Mr. Hunt, candidate for state senate from Scottsbluff, Nebraska, claims to be an economic scientist not a politician. Although he has never taken a course in economics, he ridicules Mr. Babson, one of the foremost economists of the nation.

Mr. Hunt graduated from the University of Nebraska in 1899. His son also graduated from the university and is now teaching at Brown's College.

Mr. Arndt will attempt to explain the theory in his regular 10 o'clock class Wednesday morning.
