Stoke discusses scientific advance

Approximately sixty students and faculty members who attended a meeting of Phi Lambda Upsilon, national honorary chemistry society, Tuesday evening at the Cornhusker hotel heard Dean Harold W. Stoke of the university Graduate college point out that "Every major discovery in the physical sciences has been accompanied by profound influences upon social thought."

"This was true first in the formulation of Newton's law of motion. The biologists' formulation of the theory of evolution," he said, "also produced a whole series of interpretations of society as an organism which grew, changed and died."

Eric Kneen, assistant chemist at the College of Agriculture experiment station; Earl J. Smith of Kearney; Edward J. Cragoe, Baldwin City, Kas., graduate students; and Ray Crancer of Lincoln, junior in the department of chemistry, try were initiated as members of the society preceding the address.
