With the Bizad Independent faction definitely not in the election because of the failure of the Student Council to take action in its meet-

A quorum was not present at the Council meeting yesterday aft-
because of the absence of representatives of the Progressive ernoon because of the absence of representatives of the Progressive
faction. Professor E . W. Lantz, facuty advisor to the Council, ex-
piained to to te group his reasons. for declaring that the Pizad Indend. ent faction was not a party, and could not run in the election today.
end
Grant Reed, president of the Liberal faction who protested to Council that the new party was legal, said Lantz' reasons were probably these:

First, according to the Council constitution, any protest of a declon the decision and the Council ultimatum is invalid until the faculty committee rules.

Danger in college factions.
Furthermore, if colleges were allowed to form factions, serious
onsequences would result. Inter-college rivalries would be formed and distinctions made, where few exist now. And colleges which were dominated completely by men would have a great advantage over colleges
where a majority of those enrolled are women becaus allowed to participate in politics. College factions would also mean the complete breakdown of the present party system which transcends college lines.
As for the Bizad college, since they are already allowed two rep-
resentatives, the new faction would have to poll at least 63 votes over 250 to gain any proportional representation, and the total vote from say that proportional representation refers to faction vote and not to votes in any particular colleges.

Last, Mr. Lantz regarded the new faction as a Progressive attempt gain a seat on the Council thru proportional representation. This
contention, he believes, was borne out by the fact that all three of the candidates nominated by the new faction were members of Progressive raternities, and by the absence of Progressive faction representatives
