

NU prof writes philosophy book

Dr. W. H. Werkmeister, associate professor of philosophy, is the author of a new book, "A Philosophy of Science," published Aug. 17 by Harper & Brothers, New York City.

The book is described by the publishers as "a thoughtful and scholarly presentation of a well-reasoned philosophy of science, aiming at two objectives: the establishment of an epistemological point of view—implied by the sciences themselves; and the integration of the various fields of scientific knowledge."

"Sweeping..." The Scientific Book Club Review in its August number says of Dr. Werkmeister's book, "In spite of the many excellent histories of science that have previously been recommended...we venture the opinion that never before has there appeared in one volume so sweeping and at the same time so searching an appraisal as will be found in the present book."

In his preface, Dr. Werkmeister explains that the subject matter of his one-year, senior-division course in philosophy of science at the University of Nebraska "provides in all essentials the contents of this book, and my hope is that the book may be found useful as a text for similar courses dealing with the philosophical aspect of the sciences."
