## After all these years

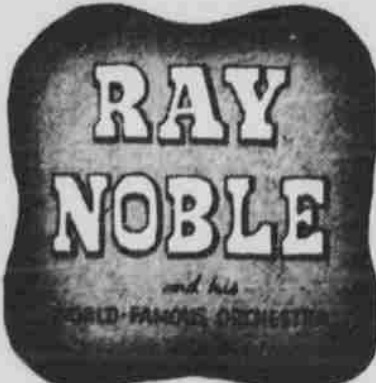
Chi O Gloria Hanson and Delta Sig Joe Flammang have decided to call off the grade school—high school—college romance.

## Klub sends sing invitations to fraternities

Invitations for all men's greek houses to participate in the annual Interfraternity Sing to be held on the morning of Ivy Day, were sent out by the Kosmet Klub yesterday, according to Leo Cookzley, president. Entries must be turned into the Kosmet Klub office before Monday.

Judges for the sing will be men who are not training contestants. Their decisions will be based upon general excellence of the participants' efforts rather than upon technical perfection.

The winner will be awarded the loving cup which will remain in that fraternity's possession until Ivy Day of 1942. Alpha Tau Omega won the cup last year.

### Rules of sing.

1. No fraternity may use more than a total of 25 men including the director. The pianist will be excluded from that total and may be used as a 26th man.
2. Each fraternity will be allowed to sing one song only of its choice. No fraternity may use the same song as it used last year.
3. All entries must be made to Kosmet Klub office by mail or in person on or before Monday, April 28. Sign the name of your fraternity on the bottom of the letter and send to Kosmet Klub office in the Student Union with a list of the members participating. Kosmet Klub must be notified of any further additions to this list after April 28.
4. All participating organizations must be on the grounds and ready to sing by 9 a. m. Ivy Day morning.

"Every fraternity is urged to enter the competition," Cookzley stated.

## Railroad hostess speaks on AWS vocational series

Head hostess of the Burlington railroad lines, Miss Velma McPeck, who was appointed to the position of the first woman passenger supervisor in 1936, will speak in the third of this semester's series of vocational lectures in Ellen Smith tomorrow at 4 p. m.

Speaking on "How to Meet the Public," she will also discuss positions open to women in the transportation line. The series is sponsored jointly by the AWS board and the dean of women's office.

Miss McPeck graduated from the School of Domestic Arts & Sciences in Chicago, and has taught elementary and high school music in Kansas.

Store manager. In addition to being the first woman appointed passenger supervisor on the Burlington railroad, Miss McPeck has been manager of a department store and of tea-rooms in Kansas and Oklahoma. "This speaker's topic, 'How to Meet the Public,' should be of interest to everyone," declared Dean Hosp in urging coeds to attend the meeting.

In connection with vocational training, the dean's office has received several letters in the past two weeks inquiring about the ability and character of women graduating in June.

## Credit men hear Cochran

"American Foreign Relations—1941" was the subject of Prof. Cochran's lecture when he spoke before the Association for Wholesale Credit Men at the Cornhusker Sunday.

Prof. Cochran emphasized the meaning of foreign policies and importance to present situation during the past ten years in his speech. "Twenty-four nations have been under domination of totalitarianism," he declared. "But we can't allow Britain to go down."

"There has been a remarkable change in the British empire since 1931," he pointed out.
