

### Credit men hear Cochran

"American Foreign Relations-1941" was the subject of Prof. Cochran's lecture when he spoke before the Association for Wholesale Credit Men at the Cornhusker Sunday.

Prof. Cochran emphasized the meaning of foreign policies and importance to present situation during the past ten years in his speech. "Twenty-four nations have been under domination of totalitarianism," he declared. "But we can't allow Britain to go down."

"There has been a remarkable change in the British empire since 1931," he pointed out.
