Symphony's Guest Soloist . . .

Chenoweth Scores Success As Pianist in Concert Here

. . . Also Outstanding as Composer

The appearance of Wilbur Chenoweth as guest soloist with the Lincoln Symphony Orchestra proved to be the highlight of Monday night's concert in St. Paul's church, the second of this season's series. The former Nebraskan's double reputation as composer and accomplished pianist met the anticipated high expectations in the first performance of his "Fiesta," a concert piece for piano and orchestra.

Chenoweth's composition contained some fine tunes based on Spanish folk music. These well arranged in a conventional combination of solo instruments and orchestra, created the desired effect of lightness and gaiety extremely pleasing to the ear at first hearing.

Of his own group of piano pieces the "Variations on a 17th century German Choral" were of particular musical interest. The "Bourree and Musette" and the "Concert Waltz" were followed by an encore, "In a pale," in all three works Chenoweth again displayed his originality and musicianship both as creative and interpretative artist.

Orchestra Scores.

The Lincoln Symphony Orchestra under the direction of its regular conductor Leo Kucinski scored almost equally high in applause of the large sized audience. The pleasurable tunes of Hagedorn's "Hansel and Gretel" furnished a pleasant introduction to the evening's concert.

The performance of Mendelssohn's "Italian Symphony" showed a well balanced symphony orchestra in a very satisfying execution of one of the symphonic standard works of music. "The Sorcerer's Apprentice," probably one of the most difficult works of the evening was given a fine reading by Kucinski, and although the piece was timed somewhat slow, the enjoyment at the fine execution and over the humorous value of the music itself was not lessened a bit. An almost similar effect was reached in Shostakovich's "Satyrical Dance."

A well known and well liked medley of Irish melodies by Victor Herbert brought the concert to a spirited conclusion and sent a well satisfied audience home, probably humming or whistling happily.
